How Were the Pyramids Built?

Wonder is often expressed at the ability of the engineers of ancient Egypt to construct the great pyramid of Gizeh. According to one estimate, no less than 100,000 men must have been employed, during a period of 20 years, to build the largest of these pyramids. It has also been assumed that the ancient possessed immense machines

which could hardly be matched in our day. At a recent meeting of the Philosophical Society in Washington, Mr. J. E. Watkins read an illustrated paper on this subject, and showed how the great pyramids could have been erected without the use of complicated or gigantic machines, and without the employment of an enormous force of workmen. The principle employed by the pyramid-builders, according to Mr. Watkins, was that of the inclined plane. By banking up the surface with earth, the builders were able to carry the great stone blocks to the summit with the aid only of levers and pry-bars. Afterward the earth was removed and the ground levelled.
