H. OSBORNE AGAIN.

His Wife For Divorce in San Francisco.

An issue of the Oregonian last week was a press dispatch from San Francisco in which G. Howard Osborne, formerly of this city, is in publication. The article in question states that Osborne is a former minister of the gospel, and is now seeking separation from his wife, whom he has been living with another man as man and wife.

People here are hardly surprised by Osborne's actions, but they put no more in his plea of improper conduct. Rather do they think that he has tired of her and wants to "cut loose" from one who has dishonored him. While it was a frequent rumor that her conduct at his hands was not the least not equal to the respect which would naturally expect from a minister of the gospel to his wife's help. He sold his property, and but for his state on short notice would have been arrested. He collected money from the Buena Vista church to pay the church owed Frazier & Rice, pocketed the money for his own use. He took things not belonging to the church people here say, the parsonage. He endeavored to use the ministerial force of the Buena Vista church, but that church investigating his record refused to have him. He has a marvelous ready speaker and well educated. 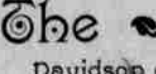
Last week's items.
