Oregon's Wonderful Lake.

The lake is six miles long by about four and a half miles in width, and is completely encircled by precipitous walls varying in height from 1,000 to 2,000 feet above the water. The greatest elevation of the crater rim above sea level is 8,200 feet. Out of the lake rises a volcanic cone, called Wizard Island, 840 feet high. When it has been rendered easy of access, Crater Lake will rank, among the wonders of natural scenery, with the Yellowstone and Yosemite valleys and the Grand Canon of the Colorado.
