

GEO. STOLL BOUND OVER

In Dallas Jail He Awaits the
Convening of May Term
Of Circuit Court

DEFENDANT OFFERED
NO DEFENSE.

Stoll Did Not Go On Wit-
ness Stand Nor Make any
Denial of Offense
Charged.

In the county jail at Dallas, J. G. Stoll awaits the convening of the next grand jury.

The charge against him is lewd cohabitation with Anna Stoll his alleged first wife. He was given a preliminary hearing Tuesday and his bond placed at \$750. This, at last accounts, he was unable to give, though he has been communicating with parties in Portland concerning the matter from the Dallas jail.

Constable J. H. Moran went to Portland on Friday and returned with Stoll on Saturday. Officer Hawley had arrested him on Friday and he was held awaiting the arrival of the Independence constable. Stoll brought with him an attorney, J. L. Taugher, and Tuesday was agreed upon as the day for a hearing before Justice Wilson. Stoll's bond pending hearing, was fixed at \$1000. There was an effort on the part of Attorney Taugher to have the amount of the bond reduced but upon conference with District Attorney Hart and finding that the bond was considered reasonable by that officer, it was allowed to stand and being unable to secure bondsmen, Stoll was taken to Dallas and lodged in the county jail until Tuesday.

At 2 p. m. Tuesday Constable Moran produced the defendant in Court. The trial was had in the city hall, and it was packed, a number of women being among the spectators. District Attorney Hart was present to represent the state and Attorney Taugher was on hand to look after his client's interest. Miss Oberson took the stand and said she worked for Stoll when the Mormon elders were stopping at his house. The elders, Miss Oberson said, occupied one room; Stoll and Anna Stoll another, while the child slept on a cot and she herself on a lounge, leaving the inference that Stoll and Anna Stoll stayed together.

Charles Smith stated that he had been introduced to Anna Stoll as the wife of the defendant and that the introduction was through Stoll himself.

Mrs. A. M. Hurley, an officer of the Fraternal Union of America, was called. She showed by the record that Stoll had taken out an insurance in that order payable to Anna Stoll, his wife, and that Anna Stoll had insurance in the same order made out in favor of J. G. Stoll her husband.

Mrs. G. Phillips, mother of the girl Stoll married, said on the stand that Stoll invited her to his house and told her he was not married to Anna Stoll and spoke to her about marrying her daughter Elizabeth. The witness said she neither gave her consent nor made objection as the girl was of age, and, she considered, had the right to select a husband.

The defendant did not go on the witness stand, nor was there any evidence offered in his behalf. Attorney Taugher overlooked no op-

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portunity to object to the introduction of evidence by the state, and in his argument dwelt upon the allegation that the prosecution had introduced evidence tending to establish another crime than the one charged.

Justice Wilson considered the evidence sufficient to warrant holding the defendant to answer to the grand jury, and Lawyer Taugher made another appeal to have the bonds fixed at not more than \$500. District Attorney Hart thought \$1,000 none too high, and the justice made it \$750.

In default of bondsmen Stoll was returned to jail. Mrs. Anna Stoll, with her child, is in the east, and the girl wife is with her parents in this city. The Stoll restaurant is closed.

W. F. Campbell is a creditor, holding a mortgage against the business for \$400. J. W. Kirkland also has a bill of sale of the property. The household goods are under attachment by Charles Sperling.

Ready For Exhibits.

A critical stage in the development of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition has been reached. The management has progressed so successfully with the construction of the buildings and the laying out of the grounds that no further anxiety exists respecting them. The transportation facilities centering in St. Louis will naturally be strained to their utmost, although all of the transportation companies have been planning for a long time to meet the emergency.
