Mormon Elder Writes From Dallas Denouncing Stoll's Marrying Propensities.

WOULD NOT STOP AT HIS HOUSE

The Independence Baker and Restaurateur Has Still Another Family in Chicago

The actions of George Stoll is contrary to the teachings of Mormon religion.

It is true George Stoll is a member of the church, but he was not acting in accordance with its teachings in his practice of polygamy. A statement made in the Oregonian Feb. 1st said amongst other things that the Mormon Elders which were stopping with him did not approve of Stoll's actions because he would not be sealed to his former wife or the one he was living with. That statement is false. We warned him of his folly and would not live with them, when we found him trying to gain the affections of a young lady as he did, and at the time living with what we supposed to be his lawful wife and child.

After promising the woman he lived with he would make her his lawful wife, by being saving, and working hard to help him to overcome the burden of indebtedness which he had incurred at different times, I think he should be man enough to marry her and support her and the child he has brought into the world, instead of casting them upon the cold world, without any means of support, as he did a former family, which he left in Chicago, and try to ruin the life of another bright, young lady. There is some interest in the local hog market this week. Wednesday W. W. Percival shipped 121 head averaging over 180 pounds, and other shipments are to follow tomorrow. There seems to be a hog war on among the buyers, with the bears on top. The price has been raised to 5 cents which is higher than has been paid since October. The price of hogs during the past year has ranged as follows: January and February 5 1/2 cents; March 6 cents; April 6 1/2 cents; May 6 1/2; June 5 1/2; July 5; August 5 1/2; September 5 1/2; October 5 1/2; November 4 1/2; December 4 1/2. In January of this year the market started off at 4 1/2 but rose to 5 cents this week.
