OUT FOR SENATOR

United States Loughary Present County Clerk is a Candidate for State Senator.

E. C. Kirkpatrick, and J. M. Stark Also Candidates. Keyt Mentioned. Other Political Talk.

Following an editorial in the Observer of last week using his name in connection with the state senatorship for Polk county U. S. Loughary has announced himself a candidate.

The matter of entering the field had been under advisement by Mr. Loughary for several days, and upon reading the Observer's editorial he remarked: "I'm smoked out."

E. C. Kirkpatrick is still in the field and there to stay, he avers, to win out gloriously if he can, or accept defeat graciously if he must. The contest promises to be spirited and to furnish a little spice to the monotony of life in the county seat.

In Independence, it is different. J. M. Stark, a third candidate, resides here and he's the only avowed candidate outside of Dallas. The name of E. C. Keyt is persistently mentioned but those who profess to know Mr. Keyt's mind best, declare he has no intention of making the race and unless there are more smoke outs the rank and file will have only three to choose from on primary day.

The senatorial situation should not overshadow other offices fully as important to the people. The county judge-ship is not to be over-

looked. It is important to nominate for that place a man broad enough to consider the interests of the county as a whole, at all times rather than one who would discriminate against any particular section. Some think no better man than Mayor J. H. Hawley of Monmouth could be selected. The candidacy of Wesley Hodson seems to be making headway or at least he has many friends that express the belief that he possesses the necessary qualifications for a good county judge. Hardy Holman of Dallas too, still promises the best service that lies within his power if selected. The name of Wm. Riddell, who, his friends would like to see made a Commissioner, has also been mentioned in connection with the judge-ship. J. N. Teal the commissioner whose term is about to expire has not officially announced his candidacy for renomination, but it is presumed he is a passive if not an actual candidate for renomination.

The democrats have not been saying much so far as to this important office and the impression that Judge Sibby would be renominated has been allowed to go out. There however, is some dissatisfaction with the Judges administration in his own party, and new timber is being discussed. Some of the old liners favor J. W. Kirkland of this place, though Mr. Kirkland does not seem to be seeking the place.

For the other offices there is no new crop of candidates, for this week. Mayor Cooper is willing to serve the people in the legislature, but like Mr. Teal, he has not started an aggressive campaign. G. W. McLaughlin of the Buena Vista precinct is not averse to running for county treasurer and his announcement is expected not later than next week.

GEORGE H. WILLIAMS.

The Pacific Monthly Pays A Deserved Tribute To An Honored Pioneer.

The Pacific Monthly for March pays the following tribute to Judge Williams, the "Grand Old Man" of the Northwest:

George H. Williams, the mayor of Portland, occupies a unique place among the citizens of Oregon. He was the friend of Lincoln, the intimate of Grant, and was closely associated, in their most important work, with such men as Edwin M. Stanton, Oliver P. Morton, Zachary Chandler, William Pitt Fessenden Thaddens Stevens, John Sherman, and Roscoe Conkling. He has survived them all, and although he is upwards of fourscore years of age his mind is clear and vigorous and his life useful.

Without the aid of a college education, Judge Williams has become a scholarly, well read man. Without wealth he has attained prominence. He has held some of the highest offices in the gift of the people; yet to-day he is as companionable and approachable as the humblest resident of the city over which he presides. His confidence in men has been abused; he has been imposed upon again and again, but he has not lost his kindness of heart nor his sympathy with his fellow men. He has grown old without losing the buoyancy of youth, and he is never happier than in the companionship of jolly young men. He is fond of a good story and tells one with all of the zest of a college boy.

As an occasional speaker, Judge Williams is eloquent, earnest, and concise; as a lawyer, able and scholarly; as a citizen, patriotic and conscientious; as a man, upright and large of heart. His very faults spring from an excess of virtue. He is so generous and sympathetic that he can not recognize that other men are less honorable than himself. May he be spared to us for many years to inspire us to higher ideals and to instruct us through an experience garnered from an honorable life, rich in public service.
