AN IMPORTANT OFFICE.

One of the most important officers to be selected in the coming campaign is that of District Attorney. This office is one that requires the highest degree of integrity and honesty and the man chosen to fill it, like Caesar's wife should be above suspicion. It is even more essential to the rights and protection of individuals and society to have a man that cannot be swerved from the path of duty and justice in this office than on the bench as circuit judge; for if the judge goes wrong the supreme court can right his acts but under the present law, the district attorney may take the place of the old common law institution of a grand jury. In this district a grand jury is seldom called and if one be called, the district attorney is legal adviser while the jury is usually made up of men inexperienced in the technicalities of law and the district attorney is the controlling power.

Under the present law, the district attorney may alone, without the intervention of a grand jury, draw an indictment, against an individual, prosecute him and take his life. The opportunity for mischief is unlimited if the district attorney be an unscrupulous man. It is within his power not only to wink at law-breaking but to menace law-abiding citizens.

Polk county has furnished the district attorney for this district, Polk, Marion, Linn, Yamhill and Tillamook counties the past four years. The total

salary is \$4150 but deputies are paid out of this sum. Percy Kelly, deputy for Linn county receives \$400; R. L. Conner for Yamhill, \$250; H. T. Betts for Tillamook, \$200; J. H. McNary for Marion, \$500, but McNary is allowed an additional sum to that named in the law. There is an allowance of \$250 for deputy hire for Polk county but since the district attorney lives in this county he does not have to pay that out.

J. N. Hart, the present incumbent is a candidate for re-election. The importance of the position together with the salary of \$2800, that may be saved, will probably bring out others, though there is as yet no avowed candidate in opposition to Mr. Hart. There is some opposition to Mr. Hart but as yet it is not organized nor centered on any other candidate. The nomination is by delegates to the state convention and solicitude for delegates will be more in evidence after delegates are named at the primaries.

NEWBERG WANTS IT

The Newberg Graphic, which has been taking interest in a proposed change of railroad service says: "On last Saturday the writer called on W. E. Coman of the passenger department of the Southern Pacific and in a few minutes conversation laid some of these matters before him. He said he was glad to be reminded of these conditions just at this time as officials were considering some important changes in the passenger service of the West Side lines. The Graphic is convinced that the people have a good friend in the person of Mr. Coman and further that he will go as far in the improvement of the service as the officials in the head offices will permit."

"It is always expected that a railroad company will put on more trains when the business is in plain view, but it is also true that a company can often be induced to increase the service when the profits may not be so plainly in sight, if the

people continue to press their claims for up-to-date service. The S. P. has been "slow" with the Yamhill branch but the Graphic expects to see within the next sixty days a change for the better with a morning train out of Portland which will run to McMinnville by way of Whiteson and then back to Whiteson and on to Sheridan, and returning by same route in the evening. Such a change would give us a morning mail, an opportunity to reach Portland in the evening, and also rail communications with the county seat—three important changes the people of Newberg will very much appreciate."

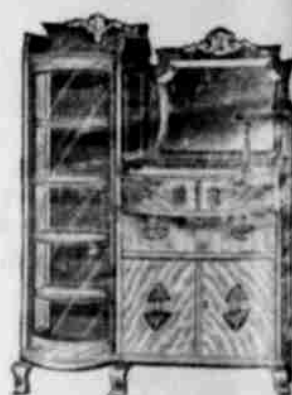
