J. R. Burton, United States senator from Kansas, has been found guilty of receiving illegal fees in his official capacity, and sentenced to six months in jail and also to pay \$2,500 fine. This is the first case of the kind on record.

Salem democrats held a banquet at the Willamette hotel in Salem Monday night. In some respects it was comparable with the banquet recently given by the Polk County Republican club at Independence, and in some respects it was not.

The following bit of philosophy by Governor Geer, recently promoted from the governor's chair to the editorship of a paper, is apropos to the day: "For the defeated candidates the Statesman editor is in a position to feel the deepest measure of sympathy. Few things are more difficult in this life than to assume a natural smile of genuine pleasure over a defeated aspiration. It is quite impossible to so gloss it over that the spurious nature of the veneering will not plainly assert itself. But it is some of the unavoidable results of political contests and when the defeat has been brought about fairly and without abuse, it is the duty of the disappointed man to make the best face he has at his command. Even then his best friends are likely to have difficulty in recognizing him."

"Uncle" Ben Hayden said of the trio sent to Washington to back up the delegation in securing an appropriation for the Lewis and Clark fair, that it was a useless expense to the taxpayers. Scott, he said, had some sense but neither Jeff Myers nor Whit Boise could make a speech before congress.

Russel Wyatt is at Burns, Harney county, trying a murder case. There is not a county seat in the United States so remote from a railroad as Burns or Wyatt would probably be there. And yet it may be he ran too soon for he may be nominated for circuit judge before he has time to return.

The press of the state, without exception, has a good word for C. H. Markham, recently transferred by the Harriman railroad system from Texas to San Francisco. The people of Oregon appreciate the efforts of Mr. Markham in their behalf when he had charge of the Oregon lines.

After trying every conceivable way for a revocation of the disbarment order and failing, he succeeded Monday in convincing the supreme court he had never been admitted anyway and the court decided to admit him.
