A Big Hop Contract.

One of the brewery concerns of Milwaukee has contracted to receive 10,200 bales of hops, or a little over 20,000,000 pounds. These hops will be the entire product from the California ranch of E. Clemens Horst of San Francisco, who is said to be the largest grower of hops in the world, with large ranches in California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. Recently he took a run to Milwaukee from Chicago while enroute home from an Eastern trip, and while there he closed the deal for the entire output of the California ranch.—Orchard and Farm.

The same Clemens Horst has one of the largest hop ranches in Oregon near Independence, Polk county. Just north of this city, the Horst Bros. have over 400 acres of hops. They are up-to-date in their methods and only last week received an immense shipment of fertilizer for their yards. The Krebs Bros., also extensive hop growers, recently purchased a tract of 640 acres near Independence on the south and are putting out more hops. In fact all the big hop dealers of the country, almost without exception have interests in hops in this vicinity and Independence hops are becoming as well known in the markets of the world as Columbia river salmon, Walla Walla wheat or Kentucky whiskey.

A Hard Problem.

The qualifications of Luther Grounds and Johnnie VanOrsdell as surveyors are receiving a test in the effort to establish the lines bounding a tract of land sold by Mrs. Merwin some years ago to R. J. Wilson. The land afterwards passed into the hands of J. H. Hawley and was sold by him to John Burton and O. D. Rider, Burton getting 40 acres and Rider 33, under the assumption that there was 73 acres in the tract. It seems there was less than 73 acres in the first place, hence the difficulty of dividing it into two tracts of 40 and 33 acres. Land disputes in some countries have been the source of endless trouble, sometimes leading to the commission of crime and in this case where there seems to have been an error handed down for years, it is commendable to the parties involved that a regard for the rights of others prevails and no semblance of hard feelings is allowed to creep in. If men would always be guided by the same spirit of unselfishness, costly litigation and neighborhood quarrels would be unknown.

Labor in Demand.

With fair weather came the demand for labor and teams, and on Sunday twenty-five or thirty teams could easily have been hired out in Independence. Among those on the streets looking for teams was Leonard Krebs. Up till Sunday the Krebs Brothers had been running but five teams. They have since secured two and would like five or six more. L. Damon wanted a team; Sam Irvine was looking for a team; Joe Hubbard would have hired one and Jodie Morrison wanted four or five for Horst Bros. Mr. Morrison went to Salem in search of teams, but it is not likely he will find a surplus there as the Krebs Bros. have already made inquiries at that place and failed to find what they wanted.

Hotel Re-Leased.

J. Conner has re-leased the Willamette hotel in Salem for a term of six years and is having it overhauled and put in first-class shape. New linoleum has been put on the office and hall floors, dining hall frescoed, stairways carpeted and the rooms touched up with the artist's brush. Conner is one of the

few that has made a success of the Willamette hotel. He has been a good man for Salem, paying out large sums of money monthly in the city, and people of that place owe his newly equipped hotel liberal patronage.
