

**FREAK OF NATURE.**

**A Tree Encased Within Another Well Preserved Tree Still Remains.**

On the old donation land claim of Mr. Zumalt (deceased) stands a large balm stump from which Adam Lindeman cut a tree some ten years ago. This stump, now in the process of decay, measures 16 1/2 feet in circumference. There was nothing striking about this in itself. S. R. Withrow visited Mr. Lindeman while at work at the large balm and noticed what seemed to be something out of the usual order. This caused them to investigate more closely, and to their great astonishment found that a small balm tree had once stood directly in the center of the large one, and the well preserved stump still remained, showing the marks of the woodman's axe, perhaps a hundred years before the outer balm was cut. The stump encased in the balm measured nine inches in diameter. This phenomena points back to the time, perhaps, of the Lewis & Clark visit to Oregon, and if the stumps were in good preservation it would be a fine specimen for the 1905. The question is, who cut the first tree?
