## WORK OF ART

### Bust of Shakespeare Presented To State Normal School.

#### MONMOUTH.

Unfortunately the piece did not arrive till after the commencement exercises had closed, so the presentation was delayed. It came on Friday of last week, making the trip from Boston without being marred in the least. It is a beautiful work of art and is free from blemishes. It stands about two and one half feet high and rests on a bracket supported by a Corinthian capital. The bust presents a most striking resemblance to the authentic pictures of Shakespeare and adds much to the appearance of the assembly room.

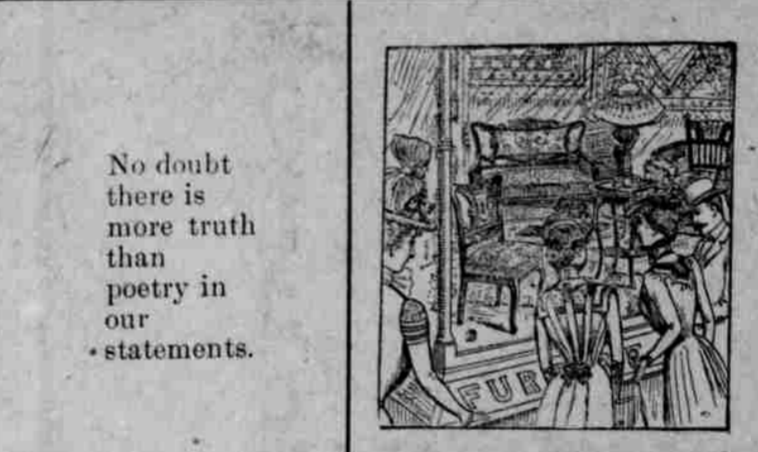
