Desperate Conditions In Russia The recent assassination of the governor of Finland is but one of many signs of the growing unrest of the people in the Russian empire. Similar signs are to be observed in Poland, in the Caucasus and in other parts of the czar's dominions. Industrial activities are being paralyzed. Thousands of workmen are being thrown out of emin traffic the railroads are reducing their forces. The amount of goods shipped this year compared with last has decreased over one-third. Of this the New York Times says:

On the railway lines of European Russia and Poland alone it is computed that 60,000 men have been discharged during the last four months. The number of laborers and artisans throughout the empire thrown into idleness during the sams period is estimated at from 300,000 to 400,000, the bulk of whom entertain little hope of finding remunerative employment until the end of the war. This army of unemployed is steadily increasing at the rate of at least 3,000 a day.

The war in the far east is not the only and not even the most serious proposition that Russia has to face. The frequent mutinles among those drafted for service, the mutterings of the unassimilated peoples of the outlying provinces, the growing distress in all parts of the empire, the brutally repressive measures adopted by Minister Piehve in dealing with threatened uprisings, all point to an impending revolution which one or two severe defeats in Manchuria will almost certainly pre-St. Petersburg government against the spirit of liberty and progress have piled up a retribution which cannot be Portland. cipitate. The sins committed by the escaped. The moral debt of an individual or a nation must be paid. Whether it comes in a year or is delayed till later, that land must in time become the scene of ar internal conflict which will shake the world.

The advancement of the human race toward liberty will go forward, and any government that stands in the way of this silent but irresistible march invites its own destruction.
