The Chemawa precinct in Marion county voted "dry" at the late election. The State Fair Grounds are within this precinct and the general supposition has been that this would exclude the sale of liquors at the State Fair. President Downing of the State Fair Board has consulted Til Ford on the matter and Mr. Ford gives it as his opinion from a legal standpoint that the Chemawa precinct cannot control the actions of the State Board or say what may be done or sold on the Fair Grounds, since the board was granted by special act of the Legislature the privilege of selling licenses for the sale of any article, for a period of thirty days, the money to go

into the treasury of the board. Mr. Ford goes further and says that no special law passed by the Legislature can be superceded by a general law enacted by that body, or by the people of any precinct. It would thus be necessary for the Legislature to directly repeal the act of 1901, granting special privileges to the board, if liquor is not to be sold on the State Fair Grounds.

Mr. Ford goes further, and says that local option, which passed any county or precinct in that county, will not affect the saloons of an incorporated city when the charter passed by the Legislature confers on the city council the privilege of licensing and controlling saloons in that city.

The Board is now disposed to issue license as formerly, claiming it means about \$2,000 a year.
