ACT OF DIGESTION
ELECTRO-CHEMIC
IMPORTANT RESULT OF TEST WITH ELECTRODES ON A LIVING STOMACH

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—In an experiment conducted by Dr. Albert J. Atkins, of the California Medical College, on the living stomach of a healthy man, it has been demonstrated that the organ is electrical in its action. The experiment consisted in the introduction of a specially prepared electrode into the stomach by having the man swallow it. When the electrodes were brought in contact with about an inch square of the wall of the organ, the galvanometer registered nearly 10 millivolts of direct electrical current. It is claimed that this action proves that the whole process of digestion is an electro-chemic one; also that this current in the walls of the stomach prevents the digestion of the stomach by its own juices.
