

MACHINERY WORKS

Full of Promise According to Prof. Quaintance, to Tired Farmers

Quaintance of the university speaks of the part machinery plays in farm income and other things Prof. Quaintance says: "The future is full of promise for tried farmers machinery doing their work for them. It is estimated that twenty-one men will produce the same quantity of our principal crops, including wheat, rice, cotton, corn, oats, hay and wheat, as 100 men could fifty years ago. Withstanding the fact that we are having to expend less energy in producing necessary fruits, Quaintance finds that we are producing a better product. The use of machinery he states, is not without influence upon the quality of the product.

In the matter of preparing grain the advantage of machinery is evident. The present generation of farmers would be slow to eat bread made of flour from wheat ground by treading of horses or oxen.

Through the introduction of machinery in some cases has worked to the men displaced, in some it has been a benefit to those who have continued in agriculture.

Replacement is still going on and is likely to continue so long as man exercises his inventive genius. It is safeguarded for the individual an industrial education and it should provide this for the farmer.
