

SEASON OF LENT

Begins This Year March 8, A Fast of Forty Days not Including Sundays

Special Season of Self Denial by the Roman Catholics, Anglican and Other Churches

Lent, this year, begins March 8, and Easter falls on Sunday, April 12.

Lent is a fast of 40 days, not including Sundays. Beginning Ash Wednesday, it ends with the Saturday preceding Easter. It is made a special season of self-denial by the Roman Catholic, Anglican and other churches. Because of special penance and prayer, Lent is pre-eminently the season of spiritual revival in the churches. Lent is supposed to have its origin in a desire to commemorate the 40 days of fasting of the Savior in the wilderness, and his temptation by Satan. At first it lasted only 40 days, the length of time Christ lay in the grave. However, in time it developed into a regularly prescribed fast, observed by Christians generally, its duration in the fifth or sixth century being extended to 36 days. Either Gregory the Great, in the sixth century, or Gregory II, in the eighth, added four days to make out the forty.

A prominent device once said that one of the most impressive features of the great experience which the Lenten season commemorates was its solitariness. Withdrawal from all companionship and in the silence and loneliness of the desert, tremendous temptations came and were resisted, affording the first test of true strength.

Ash Wednesday observance is of supreme importance, the day being given up entirely to prayer. Elaborate services are carried out holy week, immediately preceding Easter. Palm Sunday commemorates the Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, accompanied by the multitude who greeted him with branches, waving palm branches and scattering them in the path. In Rome, all who attend the ceremony take away the palm branches used in the service at St. Peter's church, and keep them to be burned to ashes on the next Wednesday.

Writing Done by Inspiration. Frances Jane Crosby, best known as Fanny Crosby, the hymn writer, is receiving congratulations over the nearness of her eighty-fifth birthday, which finds her busily at work on her autobiography. In a recent chat about herself and her hymn writing Miss Crosby said: "The hymn I hold fondest is 'Safe In the Arms of Jesus.' I wrote it in 1868 in fifteen minutes, and I have always taken a little pride in this fact. W. H. Doane, who had written the music for several of my hymns, came to me one morning and said he had some music for which he wanted words. He added that he had just forty minutes to catch a train for Cincinnati, and he asked me to evolve the lines in less than that time. He sat down at the piano and played the music. I sat thinking deeply for a few minutes after he had stopped, then said, 'I think I can write it.' I hurried upstairs and in a quarter of an hour came down with the stanzas as they are sung today. I believe the hymn was dictated by the spirit of the Lord. It is a splendid mission hymn, and it has brought comfort to tens of thousands. What a blessing it is to me to have written it! I have written more than 6,000 hymns, but 'Safe In the Arms of Jesus' is my favorite one of all. Miss Crosby had been writing hymns three years and other verse for a longer period when she produced her favorite among 6,000 in fifteen minutes. No doubt it was inspired—inspired by the devout emotions produced during three years of contemplation and the indwelling spirit thus made welcome and potent. This does not discredit belief in the divine element in a case of that kind; but, as one of the classical hymn composers wrote, 'God moves in a mysterious way.' It is not wise to wait for divine inspiration nor any other quick acting infatuation. One must get to work and be in line when an agent is wanted. Cowper's hymn, just referred to, was inspired by a most dramatic episode in the life of the poet. 'Abide With Me!' was the cry of a soul upon whom the eventide of sorrow was fast descending. In the long run it is the pen which has been dipped in the heart's blood of him who wields it that speaks most eloquently.
