Mr. Cook was born in Kentucky

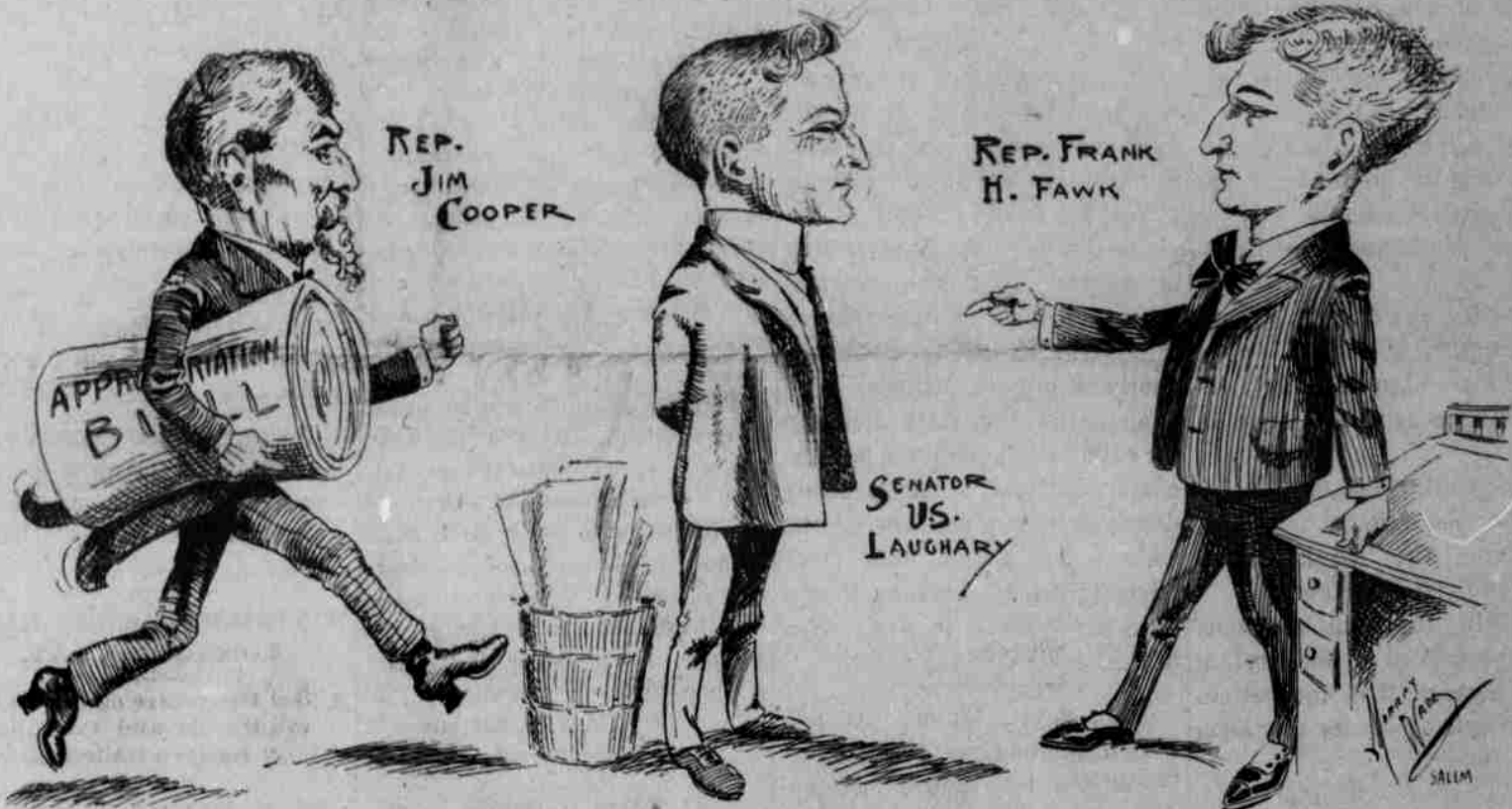
