He attends meetings over the county and personally encourages the people to take an interest in preparing an exhibit for Marion county. The people of Marion are to be commended for the enterprise they are manifesting. But what they are doing in Marion is being done for Marion county and not for Polk. It is time interest in Polk county's exhibit should be general and every citizen of the county exerting himself or herself toward building up the Polk county exhibit. Mrs. F. A. Wolfe of Falls City is in charge and upon application she will give directions as to growing, preparing and placing any thing you may have for the exhibit. The Polk county court, which should take the lead in the matter, has not been very aggressive in assuring for Polk first place at the big Fair, but the people make generous allowance for the illness of the County Judge. Since the presiding member is almost on his feet again, preparations for the exhibit will no doubt be hurried along henceforth. The Lewis and Clark Club of Independence have set a good example in taking steps to secure a fruit display. Every town and locality should be active. We are in the contest. Polk is the best county in the state. For two years in succession she has won the premium against all competition at the State Fair. She can't afford to lose out at Portland. Less than two months till the Fair opens. Let PREPARATION be the watchword.

## Deeds Of Daring

the barrel from another gun of the same caliber.

It remained for Sheriff James Culver of Marion county, Deputy Sheriff Harry Minto and Warden Frank Curtis of the penitentiary to secure evidence revealing the identity of the parties furnishing the guns.

After two years and ten months the officers are convinced they have the evidence that will convict Harry Wright and Charlie Monte. Both served in the Oregon penitentiary with Tracy and Merrill. Both were discharged from prison a few days before the outbreak and the supposition is that Tracy had it arranged with them to bring the guns over the walls at night and cache them at the working place of Tracy and Merrill in the shops.

Harry Wright is an Oregon reform school boy as well as an convict. Since his release from the penitentiary he has been convicted of grand larceny committed in Kittitas county, Wash., and is serving a 3-year sentence in Walla Walla under the name of Mutehart. Monte is back again in the Oregon penitentiary doing a six-year term for larceny committed in Pendleton in 1902. He was sentenced under the name of "W. Bennett." Both were suspected of the daring deed of carrying guns over the prison stockade at the time of the outbreak and both were shadowed, but positive evidence was lacking. Wright was in hiding several months after the outbreak. The evidence in the hands of the officers will be submitted to the grand jury in session at Salem this week.

Thomas G. Greene one of the authors of the direct primary law, explained to a Peoples Forum audience in Portland Sunday, something of the purpose of the law.

He said: "But the law was not the creature of simple inclination nor the whim of some set of men who had hobbies to ride. It was the outcome of a universal desire on the part of the people for relief from the established political rule. By that it is not meant a revolt from a party creed, but rather a swinging of the pendulum back towards the simplicity of the first days of the Republic when the Nation was, strictly speaking, a government of for and by the people, not an instrument in the hands of political bosses or parties. The direct primary law was simply the call of the people for protection, the creation of an instrument by which they could shield themselves from the effects of politics and the evils of machine rule."
