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Statement No. 1 principle has won out in Idaho, and tariff revision in Iowa. Though fought by the machine in Idaho, W. E. Borah, the brilliant young lawyer of Boise, who had the courage to stand up for the people in their demand for a change in the method of electing United States senators, won out and is the nominee of the republicans of Idaho, as Jonathan Bourne is of the republicans of Oregon. The only difference in the situation as to Mr. Bourne and Mr. Borah, is that Bourne was nominated by the people under Oregon's Direct Primary law and Borah was nominated under Idaho's convention system. Governor Cummins, honest and outspoken in his convictions for tariff revision, with the people at his back, has downed the Iowa machine, which is another significant omen. The republican party, until recently top-heavy with safe majorities and machine-ridden to the disgust of the rank and file, is showing signs of reform within that augurs well for the safety of the party and prosperity of the country.
