The track will be plowed in a few days, the stables are being repaired and very shortly the general arrangements will be up to Mr. Bailey's careful standard. The Albany track is in respect of soil and natural conditions a splendid track and in racing trim is one of the fastest mile tracks in the Northwest. Considerable expectations are based upon the plans of the present proprietor and it is hoped a meeting will be held there next season.—Rural Spirit.
