For Construction of Three Bridges Four Mills.

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the construction of one steel span 100 feet long with the forty feet approaches at each end, at Independence. One sixty-foot span wood bridge with 30 feet approach at each end. One at what is known as the Flannery bridge. One forty-five foot span wood bridge at what is known as the Ash wall near McCoy.

Also for making four dills as follows: At Independence, length about 45 feet, average height, about 13 feet. Flannery fill, length about 10 feet, average height, about 7 feet. Small fill, length, about 26 feet, average height, about 6 feet. Lung fill, length about 140 feet, average height, about 4 feet.

That said bids as received will be opened by the county court at the county court room, in Dallas, Oregon, on the 15th day of April, 1908, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved by the court. Plans and specifications may be found on file at the county clerk's office on and after April 4th, 1908. Certified check for five percent of each bid must be delivered with each bid, and sufficient bond will be required by the successful bidder on entering into a contract. Bids will be received for the steel bridge and steel work separately, and for each of the wood bridges or as a whole for all bridges and fills, or for bridges separate and fills separate from bridges.

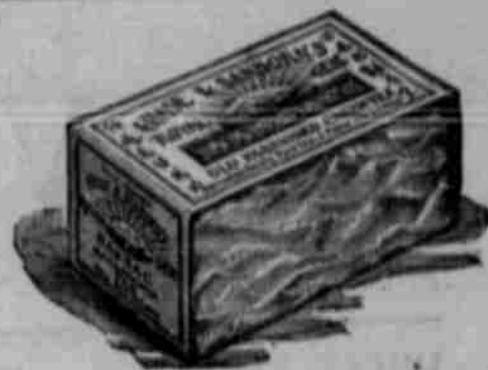
