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J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction, in an interview recently published in the Oregonian and also reprinted in this issue of the Enterprise, favors the donation to the state of Oregon, to become an irreducible school fund, the lands of the Oregon & California land grant, if the same shall be recovered by the United States government. Such disposition of these lands is practicable if proper restrictions can be made to prevent the confiscation of the same into the hands of the land sharks and the framing of a law looking to this end is not the safest in the hands of the congressional bodies at Washington. At least the laws heretofore have not been effective for the interests of the people at large. The homestead laws as they are applied at this time are the safest guarantee that these lands will be properly distributed to honest homeseekers, not to say that this paper is not in favor of Mr. Ackerman's plan. His plan is favored most heartily with a guarantee that the proper restrictions will be provided so that the land will not be grabbed up by speculators. These lands are most valuable and the government should not let loose of them until laws are suggested for operation with no loop hole for confiscation. The plan of Mr. Ackerman is a favorable one and deserves consideration.
