There is a movement on foot, says the Dallas Itemizer, in the state of Oregon to hold up the small apportionment for armories for proper training of hundreds of national guardsmen in the state. This news Captain Hobson received with surprise. He said there was no investment which the people could possibly make that would give so large a return in due time. Trained citizen soldiers constitute our great hope, he said, since the policy of the country is to keep a mere handful of a regular army. "I hope the people of Oregon will not be so short sighted or so neglectful of their duty to the nation as to vote down a measure of that kind at their June election," added Captain Hobson.

CROWLEY FOR CLERK

Fred S. Crowley, the democratic candidate for the office of county clerk, is a graduate of the State Normal School at Monmouth. For the past two years he has been principal of the Falls City High School. He is a grandson of S. K. Crowley of Rickreall. S. K. Crowley is a pioneer of 1852.

The particular fitness of Mr. Crowley for the office of county clerk is not excelled by any man in the county, owing to his thorough education, received from the normal school, and his higher connection as teacher in the public school work. As a recommendation he has it to his credit that he has succeeded himself in every position to which he has been chosen.

This is the first time that he has asked suffrage of his home county for a public office. He is a man of twenty-four years of age and has the confidence of men of all positions in life.

Mr. Crowley was particularly prominent in athletics during his schooling at Monmouth. He played center on the basketball team, 1904-5, and was prominent in both baseball and football, having been manager of the baseball team in 1904.

Mr. Crowley, like the majority of the residents of Polk county does not believe it is for the best interests of the county to give more than two terms to an official. It is for that reason that he has consented to have his name appear on the ballots in opposition to Mr. Smith.

FARMERS' MARKETING UNION.

John L. Robinson of Monmouth is now organizing a Farmers' Marketing Union with a fair chance of success. This again calls to mind the old commission house to which the pro-

ducer sent his merchandise in trust and confidence. It is a published fact, while granting that there are honest commission houses, that the practice of "knocking down" on clients is not only common but general among fruit and produce commission houses. The common method of this practice is to report to the consignee that his shipments have arrived "in bad condition," and have had to be peddled about the street at a much reduced figure, while as a matter of fact the shipment arrived in good condition and was sold at a profit. In other words the commission merchant pays the shipper just what he pleases—a pittance of what is really due him—and pockets the balance. This infamous practice is not a mere occasional slip from the path of honor in the big market street; it is a well defined system of highwaymanry.

The question now comes, will Mr. Robinson's new union do away with these objections? All we will say is that it seems to us worthy of consideration.
