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Fetching Walking Suits.

Some of the most fetching walking suits seen this season have been built up in Scotch tweeds of extremely coarse weaves and having bold markings, such as wide stripe effects of pronounced colorings. There is a strong liking for this material in deep cream color and brown stripes half an inch in width. Cream color and old blue or soft green are also smart combinations. A pretty little suit in cream and brown stripes was cut with particularly good lines, and the stripes were cleverly handled.

The coat hung almost straight from the shoulders and was finished with patch pockets and collar and buttons of onion colored velvet. Another excellent model in white and gray stripes is made with a cutaway coat with an abbreviated waistcoat of heavy ottoman silk fastened with three large buttons covered with black silk.
