Will the legislators of the state of Oregon keep their faith with reference to Statement No. One when they come to nominate United States senator at the next session, January 1909?

There are many arguments which will come up in opposition when the legislators come face to face with the maneuvering inevitable of voting a republican legislature and a republican state into the ranks of the democrats—that we are inclined to believe the issue will be averted in some manner. It has already occurred to the people that they have been "out of order" in the manner in which Statement No. One has carried since its adoption. Statement No. One is nothing more than a popular nomination, and as such it has no right to a place on the regular effective ballot. This one violation should be enough to render its work ineffectual at this time. It cannot be regarded as anything but unconstitutional for the statement to have come into operation at the June election, the constitution of the United States providing that United States senators shall be elected by the legislatures of the several states. With this fact in view it is evident that Statement No. One could be voted only on the nominating ballot at the April primary election. If it is unconstitutional for Statement No. One to carry on the regular effective ballot then it is equally clear that a republican could not become pledged to a democratic candidate for

United States senator, for the further reason that the democratic candidate's name should not be entitled to a place on the republican ticket. It being apparent that Statement No. One is purely and simply a means of nominating a candidate for senator it is surprising that so grave an error in the law should have been made as to allow nominations to appear on the elective ticket.

The law is wrong in so many ways it is astonishing that it should have ever been taken seriously by the people. It's a good thing if confined to its sphere—that of nominating on the primary ballot.

Last year Sonoma county, California raised 32,000 bales of hops. The dealers claim that the crop this season will not exceed 24,000 bales while the growers place the estimate at 20,000. More than eleven acres have been dug up and many other yards have not been worked as formerly and will, therefore, produce light crops. In that county there are about 2000 bales of last year's crop on hand.
