**Henry Truman Baughman.**  
Henry Truman Baughman was born at Pleasant Hill, Lane county, Oregon, October 3, 1882. He died at Independence, Oregon, July 7, 1908. At the age of fifteen he united with the Christian church at Monmouth, under the preaching of Albyn Eason. He was an alumnus of the O. S. N. S. and one of our best Oregon teachers. For the past two years he has taught school in the Rogue River Valley. He was elected to teach in our city school at Independence. He recently received his life papers for which he had worked very hard. His death was caused by over work. He leaves his mother, Mrs. Jerome Dornasie, and one brother besides scores of friends to mourn his departure. His father, P. J. Baughman and a sister, Ollie Baughman preceded him to the better land. Services were conducted at the Independence Christian church and also at Pleasant Hill by his former pastor, Prof. E. C. Wigmore of Eugene.

**Pioneer Passes Away.**  
Died in Portland, Oregon, July 6, 1908, Joshua McDaniel. In the death of Mr. McDaniel Polk county and the state of Oregon lose one of their oldest and most highly respected pioneers. He came to this country in 1844 from Missouri and settled near Rickreall, this county, where he resided until the last year, he having moved to Portland about a year ago. He was born in Kentucky, February 3, 1825, his age at the time of his death being 83 years 5 months and 3 days. In 1848, Mr. McDaniel was married to Miss Virginia Fulkerson who survives him, together with the following children: Mrs. G. A. White, of Portland at whose home he died; N. M. and L. H. McDaniel, of Portland; W. H. McDaniel, of Dallas, and A. J. McDaniel, of Condon, Oregon. The funeral was held Wednesday, the remains being interred in Etna cemetery at Crowley. A large number of people attended the services. Mr. McDaniel was the grandfather of the Misses Cecile and Geneva Wilcox of Independence.
