He knows whereof he speaks, and the fruit people should begin right now to prepare for the shipping season of 1909. Organize, organize, organize. Every cherry grown in this valley can be sold in distant points like Denver, Chicago, the Dakotas, Montana, and even as far away as New York, if they are put into the right kind of cars for the long journey and also made in suitable condition before being packed. The raspberries grown in the Yakima valley of Washington were sold by the carloads in the principal Dakota cities this season; and the cherry and lots of the other Willamette valley small fruits

are much harder. Be up and doing, at fruit growers; and do not allow another bad selling year like the present one confront you.—Salem Statesman.

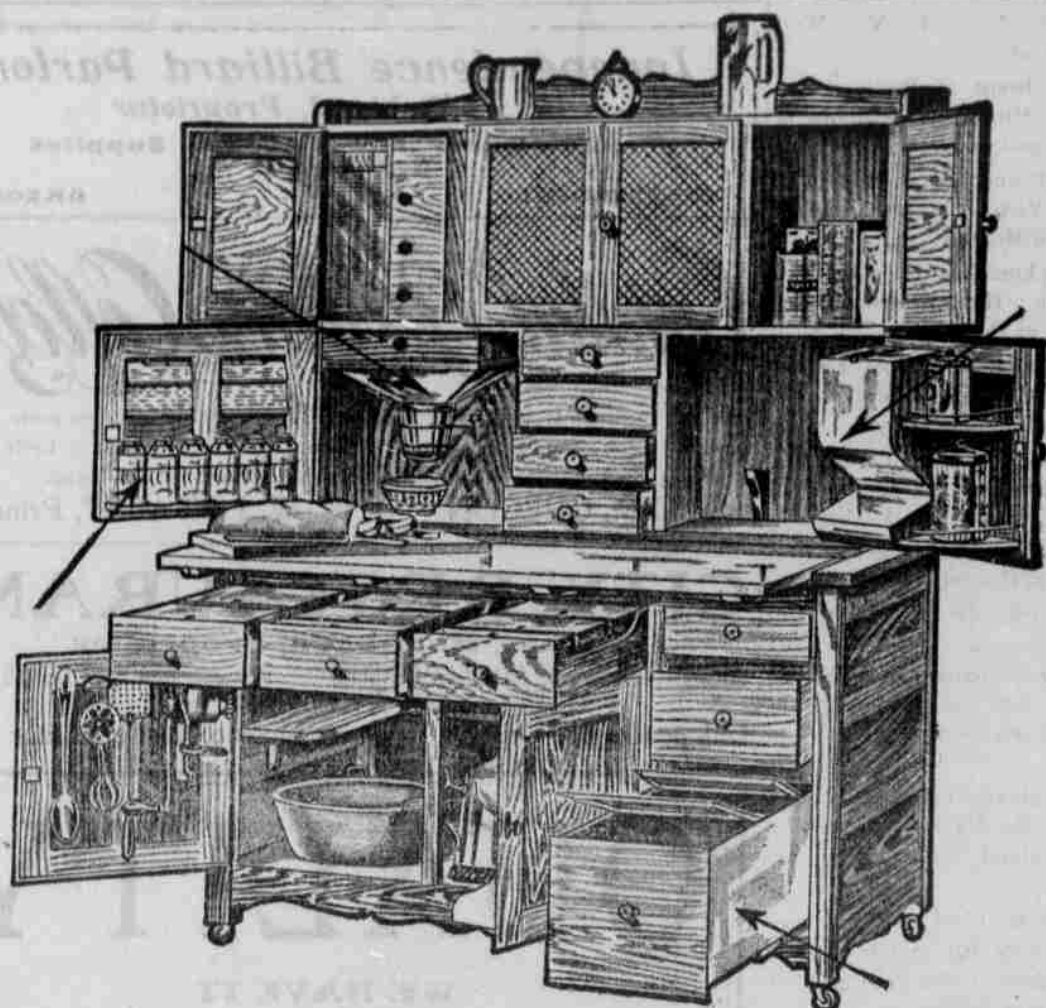
