PROGRESS OF OREGON FAIR

Will Install Modern Turnstiles to Handle Multitude.

CROWD MACHINERY COUNTED

Modern Device Will do Away With Gate Keepers and Ticket Sellers.

An electric turnstile which is operated by dropping a coin in a slot, and which counts every person passing through and records the number in the secretary's office, is the latest invention for handling the great crowds entering a modern exposition grounds, and the appliance will be used by the management of the Oregon state fair, which will be held this year from September 14 to 19.

Six of these electric turnstiles have been purchased by the management of the fair, and four will be installed at the entrance to the grandstand and enclosure. The machines are the identical ones used at the gates of the St. Louis world's fair in 1904. The appliance will do away with ticket sellers and gate keepers and other employes at the entrance. It will be necessary to have a man on the inside to make change, as the slot will not admit any other coin than a half dollar. Men will also be needed to watch the crowd to see that no lead slugs or other counterfeit are introduced into the slot.

The visitor must have his fifty-cent piece ready, but aside from that he will be put to no inconvenience. He hands the coin to the man at the gate, who drops it in the slot. This turns the stile and admits one person. The stile is immediately locked until another coin is dropped in.

Each turning of the stile is recorded by a machine which adds the number of persons admitted. The number is also recorded by electrical connection in the office of the secretary, or at any other point on the grounds. At midnight each day the officials of the fair will know exactly how many visitors have passed through the gates during the day.

Formerly it was impossible to count the big crowds accurately, and that the attendance could only be estimated. The new turnstile has been tested at the fair grounds at Salem and has been found to work perfectly in every detail.

The only difficulty will be the failure of visitors to the fair to bring the right change, but after the first day or two, when fairgoers have become familiar with the new system, no further trouble is expected.

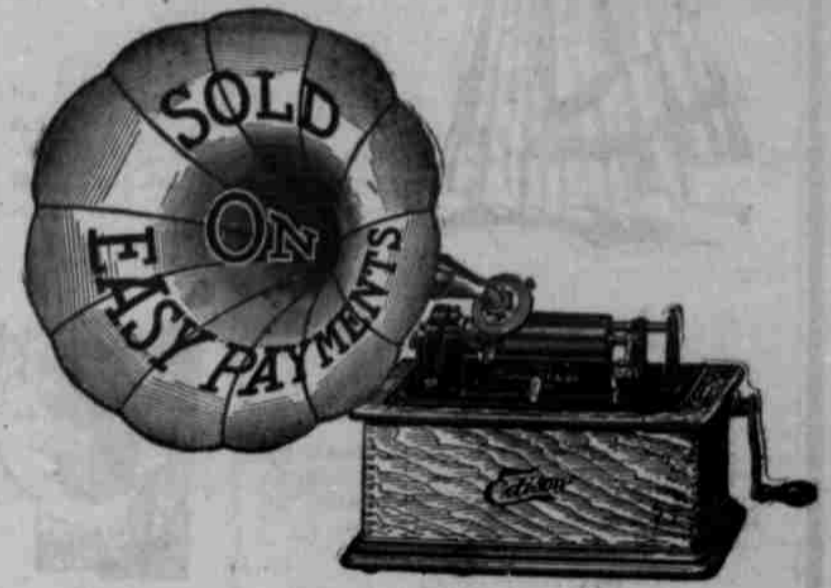
