TRIALS COME SEPTEMBER 24

Preliminaries Are Being Arranged for Meet.

WILL BE A GREAT EVENT

One of the Most Notable Gatherings Ever Held in Polk County.

The inaugural meet of the Oregon Field Trial Club will be held in the Independence country week after next for which E. A. Parsons, secretary of the club, was here Saturday arranging the preliminaries.

These trials will no doubt bring a great many visitors to Independence. Several parties are coming from California, British Columbia, and Washington, as well as one or two parties from Detroit, Michigan, and Chicago, Illinois. The trials will consist of two events; a Derby and an All-Age stake. There have been sixteen entries in the Derby and nineteen in the All-Age. These dogs are now in the hands of trainers who have located near Harrisburg to prepare them for the trial. The object of the trials is to promote interest and enthusiasm in high-class bird dogs, also to create and protect one of the richest resources of the state of Oregon—Mongolian pheasants. During these trials there are no guns permitted in the party and absolutely no birds will be killed, as the preservation of the birds is desired, not the destruction of them. Several of the dogs entered have already been in trials in California, North Dakota and Manitoba.

A cordial invitation is extended to all to witness these trials. Parties desiring to attend should bring their rigs or they can secure conveyances at the hotel by paying the same rate charged members of the club. The field trial party will leave the hotel at 7 a. m. sharp Thursday, Sept. 24th.

OREGON HOPS ARE AVERAGE

110,000 Bales Will Be Picked This Year.

AVERAGE 5 BALES TO ACRE

Next Week Will See the End of Hop Picking Season.

Within the next ten days the hops of the state of Oregon will have been harvested and most of the pickers will have returned to their homes in the various parts of the state. In some parts the yield is better than last year, but on an average it is believed that the yield is not as heavy as last season.

There will be picked in the state this year 110,000 bales. Last year there were 128,000 bales harvested and had the entire acreage been harvested the yield would have been about 155,000 bales. The acreage of hops in the state is estimated at about 22,000. It will be seen that the average yield per acre is about five bales.

Most of the hops are being picked this season, however, there is a yard here and there which will not be harvested.

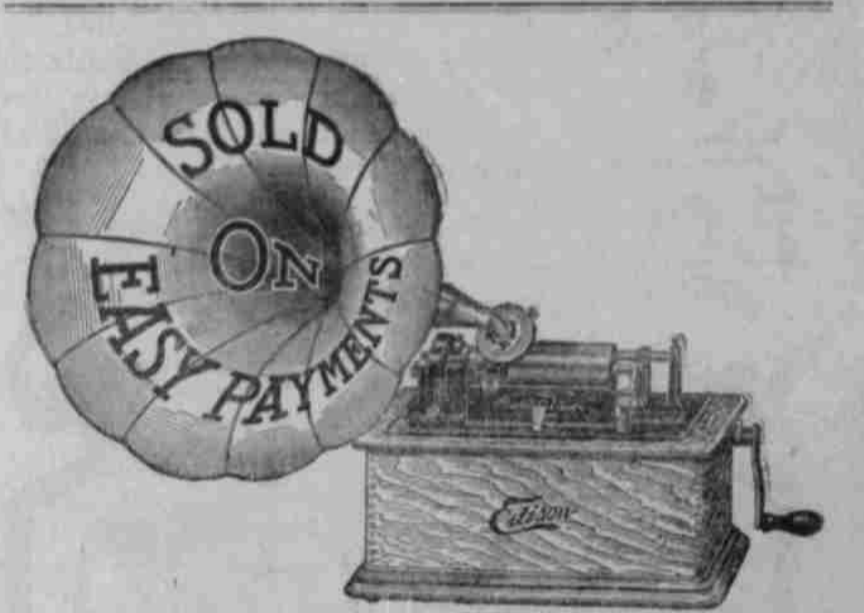
