STEVE COOPER IS DROWNED

Steve Cooper, foreman on J. R. Cooper's hop yards, was drowned Monday evening as he was leaving the ferry to return to the hop yards. He had come over to get some hop tickets for the following day's picking and was on his return when he walked from the ferry into twelve feet of water and was drowned before any assistance could be given.

On the ferry boat was a man and woman besides Mr. Cooper and he remarked to Pete Dusap that he guessed he would "just sit down here with you awhile so that they won't think I am following them." The wind was blowing gently and the ferry boat drifted out to stream. Neither Cooper nor the ferryman was aware of it and Cooper thought he was walking off on shore when he plunged off into twelve feet of water.

The river was dragged all night for the body but no trace of it could be found. Parties continued to search for the body and about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon it was found. The coroner of Marion county was immediately notified and the remains were removed to Salem without the customary inquest.

Steve Cooper was well known in and around Independence. He had worked for J. R. Cooper off and on during the last fifteen years. He was a faithful worker and liked by every one with whom he came in contact. He had no known relatives on this coast.
