Sunday School Districts of California.

The following are the Sunday school districts of California, as arranged at the late convention which met at Hollister, May 29. The brethren of the different districts whose names are placed in connection with the schools were selected by the committee to devise such means as will result in greater efficiency in the prosecution of the Sunday school work in our state.

It was universally conceded that thus districting the state, also placing in a given district such schools as are located in the adjoining neighborhoods, and then making a special effort to make the scholars more efficient, much greater good might be done.

Hence the committee urge these brethren named and such others as they may wish to assist them, as early as possible, to make arrangements for holding at least one Sunday school institute in each district, and if possible hold as many as there are schools represented, and at each institute let every Sunday school worker be present and discuss such subjects as lie at the basis of the Sunday school work.

Bro. B. S. Gardner, of Santa Clara, who was our Sunday school Evangelist last year, is retained for the current year subject to calls by the district for institute work.

We greatly desire that this be done and that the schools unite and secure Bro. Gardner's labors. He will greatly assist them in placing on foot such measures as will bring the Sunday schools of our state to a higher plane of usefulness.

Brethren, the Sunday school work is the greatest work of the age, and that brother or sister who fails to move a lever or turn a crank in behalf of God and humanity, in this age, will fall far short of being "good and faithful servants," but he that is a faithful worker in the Lord's vineyard shall receive laurels of unfading glory.

Then let us meet together, sharpen our swords, plan our attacks; that we may fight valiantly the battles of the Lord.
