

News of the Week.

Indian War.

The Indians have made an outbreak in Eastern Washington and Idaho Territories which has resulted in the butchery of many white citizens and soldiers. The women and children are generally spared. Those settlers who have escaped are taking refuge at Mount Idaho, Fort Lapwai, and other points. Loud calls for guns and ammunition for defense are being made, and responded to as promptly as possible by the military and civil authorities, as well as private individuals. The militia of Oregon and Washington are getting in readiness to go to the rescue. We know not what the end may be, but hope for the best.

Latest War News.

The first conflict in the open field between the Russians and Turks is reported to have occurred on the 15th and 16th, in Asia Minor, near Toprak Kaleh, in which the Russians were victorious.

Prince Milan, of Serbia, was kindly received by the Czar. It is the opinion of the Czar that Serbia should remain neutral.

Turks suffered an utter defeat near Spuz at the hands of the Montenegrins. The Turkish loss was very heavy. The Turks, however, report a victory.

A London dispatch to Chicago, states that a considerable British force is under orders to proceed at once to Egypt, ostensibly for the purpose of protecting the Suez Canal but more likely to establish a protectorate over Egypt.

Great Fire.

The city of St. John's New Brunswick, has had one of the most fearful fires on record. The following dispatch will give an idea of the work of desolation it has wrought:

Boston, June 22.—Of the 810 acres in the city boundaries of St. John's, 400 acres are burned over, and 20,000 residents are homeless. They have crowded in elsewhere or are under tents. The loss is still estimated at \$20,000,000, and insurance, so far as is known, about \$8,000,000. It is said all offices will pay. Robert Marshall's office, the Imperial Aetna, etc., lose \$2,000,000, North British \$1,000,000, Queen \$800,000, Northern \$500,000, Royal St. John's and others heavy, but not ascertained: the Commercial Marine \$300,000. The post office has got into the Market building, the custom house to the court house. Public relief meetings are held to day, and offers of relief from various cities are most touching. The bulk of British America offer largely in provisions, and country people along the intercolonial railroad sent all kinds of provisions. A baker to-day fed the people with pieces of bread and biscuits while they lasted. The number of dead is reported to be on the increase, but the facts are not fully known. Mrs. Crane and the young ladies of her school had to go to sea in one of the international steamers to save themselves. There were many heartrending scenes.

Oregon.

Astoria letter: There has been an average of five men drowned per week on the river this summer, and many more will share the same fate if they do not use less whisky and more caution.

A man apparently in a drunken sleep was run over by a freight train and killed near Deer creek, Douglas county, on the 19th. He was lying on the track and the train could not be stopped in time to save him.

A Yamhill editor is just married this week, and his leading editorial is an indignant protest against the easy practice that often prevails in the obtaining of divorce. It is a coincidence; but then such an essay may be regarded as always timely.—Ee.

For ten weeks, or half term, must be paid on entering the school, and like payments to be made at the commencement of each half term to the close of the session.

Board can be had in private families at from \$3 to \$3 50 per week.

DISCIPLINE.

The discipline is mild and firm, administered on the principle that virtue brings its own reward and vice its own shame. The highest incentives to virtuous actions are impressed by precept and example, while vice and immorality are restrained by all proper means. Students are taught rather to govern themselves than to be governed. Moral power is the principle, an appeal to the head and heart, self-government from Christian motive. Hence no student can be permitted to remain who indulges in card-playing, intemperance, profanity, neglect of studies, or any other vice or impropriety. Daily moral instruction based on the Bible, leaves but little else to be done in government.

MIXED SCHOOL.

Experience has demonstrated conclusively that mixed schools, under proper regulations and restrictions, possess decided advantages over exclusive institutions. Young gentlemen and ladies exercise a refining, restraining, yet stimulating influence over each other, when associated in the same school and in the same class, which nothing else can supply. They vie with each other for the wreath of honor, as they labor side by side in a common cause.

THE BIBLE.

God has given man two great volumes—Nature and Revelation—suited to his physical and spiritual constitutions. These are full of facts addressed to the understanding.

From Nature, we learn the principles which minister to the wants of the body, giving food to eat and raiment to wear. From Revelation, we receive those principles by which the spirit is fed, and clothed with truth and righteousness. Any system of education, which neglects either of these volumes is incomplete. To train the intellect in physical science and neglect the moral nature, is dangerous to society; for it imparts power which, without moral principle to guide, may be destructive to the peace and happiness both of the individual and society.
