

News of the Week.

Domestic.

August 10.—Train jumped track near Troy, Mo., killing a woman and severely wounding about thirty other passengers. Two men burned to death on steamer Lyon, which burned on Black river, N. Y. The Labor League of the District of Columbia asks the Commissioners to raise \$2,500 for the needy, and to put 2,000 men at work on public improvements, and they will use their influence with congressmen to appropriate money to cover the cost. The President, McCrary, Devens and Key will visit Bennington. Gov. J. O. Brown vice-President of the Texas Pacific, is at San Diego. The report of a rich strike in Ophir proves false. F. M. W. Holladay nominated by Conservatives for Governor of Virginia, and Gen. J. A. Walker for Lieut. Governor. \$120,000 fire at Waco, N. Y. Train on Jersey Central jumped the track near Jersey City, severely injuring forty persons.

HELENA, Montana, Aug. 11.—The following was received this morning:

BIG HOLE, M. T., Aug. 9, 1877.
To Gov. POTTS: Had a hard fight with Nez Perces, killing a number and losing a number of officers and men. We are here near the mouth of Big Hole Pass with a large number of wounded in want of everything—food, clothing, medicines and medical attendance. Send us assistance at once.

JOHN GIBBON, Col., U. S. A.

To Gov. POTTS: We had a hard fight and took the village, but were finally driven back with heavy loss. Capt. Logan and Lieut. Bradley are killed; Gen. Gibbon and Lieut. Coolidge, English and Woodruff, wounded—English seriously, the others slightly. The troops are entrenched and the Indians were leaving when the messenger left.

Aug. 11.—A meeting in Philadelphia took steps towards forming a new political party. The accident on the New Jersey Central railroad was caused by an open draw. Gen. Crook will be appointed on the commission to return Sitting Bull to U. S. soil. All treasury employees are notified to pay their just debts or they will be recommended for dismissal. The Secretary of the Navy has given employment to 3,400 persons since July 1st.

BUFFALO, Aug. 12.—During Sunday school at the Swedish Lutheran church at Jamestown, lightning struck the building killing one and prostrating four others.

Lightning also set Attica on fire, but the fire department of this city saved the village.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 12.—A courier from Gen. Gibbon arrived at Deer Lodge, Montana, at 3:30 P. M. to day with dates to the 11th. Gibbon's supply train and camp was not captured as first reported. There was no fighting after the first day's battle on the 9th. Gibbon's losses are: Killed—Capt. Logan, Lieut. Bradley and Bostwick, 17 men and 5 citizens. The wounded—Gen. Gibbon, Capt. Williams, Lieut. Coolidge, Woodruff and English, the latter seriously, besides 36 men and four citizens. The Indians suffered severely, as 40 dead Indians were counted on about one-half of the battle field. How and had arrived and would pursue the Indians as soon as his command arrived. Gen. Gibbon would move to Deer Lodge and take his wounded to Fort Shaw as soon as medical aid and transportation arrived. The Indians had disappeared, in which direction has not yet been learned.

Oregon.

In Wasco county fruit growers are canning large quantities of fruit this season.

Luther Morris killed a bear last week in the wheat field of Thomas Davis, North Yamhill.

The editor of the Corvallis Gazette has lost the third child, and last but one, of Diphtheria.

A field of fifty acres on the farm of E. C. Kite, near Bethel, yielded sixty-one bushels and eight pounds to the acre.

The steamer S. T. Church has been sold to the People's Transportation Company, report says for \$22,000. That company now has two good boats.

Mr. Burton, of North Yamhill, threshed a 50 acre field of wheat last week averaged over 40 bushels to the acre, 15 acres of which averaged 50 bushels.

A farmer in Yamhill took a demijohn of whiskey to the hands in a harvest field. Before night they had made kindling wood of a header worth \$400, and he had to start to Portland for a new one.
