

News of the Week.

Foreign.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—From reports concerning the massacres, it seems as if such affairs continue many days longer not a Christian will be left alive on the slopes of the southern Balkans.

Domestic.

BENNINGTON, Vt., Aug. 15.—This evening a railroad collision occurred at Hoosac junction, on the Troy and Boston road. The train from Troy, loaded with excursionists, was run into by the Montreal freight train. The passenger cars of the former were wrecked, and the engines with a number of freight cars, totally destroyed. Several were injured, but none seriously.

A Nashville dispatch says there was a meeting of workmen, favoring the issue of ten millions of greenbacks monthly till the distress of the country is relieved; opposing contraction; favoring the remonetization of silver, and asserting their purpose to ignore both parties.

Aug. 18.—Fall River (Mass.) factories will run on full time. Prof. Powell, of the Geological survey of the Territories, says very little of the Government land is fit for settlement. A new and more perfect gold-saving machine has been discovered. Smith son-in-law of Horace Greeley, cowhided an invalid at Chappaqua. He apologized upon learning of the debility of his victim. New Jersey silk weavers have resumed work. The town of Gayville, two miles from Deadwood, was almost entirely destroyed by fire. 200 houses were burnt; loss, \$60,000; no insurance.

Oregon.

Orrin Savage, near Silverton, lost a threshing machine by fire last week.

The Willamette at Salem has reached the lowest stage, which ought not to have happened for two months yet.

Logs have been sawed at Port Madison, Puget Sound, which weighed 25 tons each and produced over 6,000 feet of lumber. A whole raft of logs now lies there which will make over 2,000 feet each.
