NEWS OF THE WEEK.

PACIFIC COAST.

—Henry R. Mighels, editor of the Carson Appeal, died at Carson, Nevada, May 25th, aged 48 years.

—Seven and a half ounces of ore from the Norton mine, Yankee Forks, Idaho, produced \$10.

—The logging business is unusually depressed this season all over the Sound.

—Puyallup now has water works supplying the town factory, that is a mile and a quarter in length, conveying the water in a flume from the bluff.

—THE "COUNCIL FIRE."—A. B. Meachem, the United States peace commissioner who survived the massacre at the lava beds, where Gen. Canby and Dr. Thomas lost their lives is editing the Council Fire at Washington.

—Another chair will be added to the University faculty at Eugene at the beginning of next year.

—Albert Perrin, for many years foreman of the Chollar mine in Virginia, threw himself down the Standard shaft at Bodie, on the 30th, and was instantly killed.

—A port of entry directly on the boundary line between British Columbia Alaska, is soon to be gazetted.

—Mrs. Coburn, who for several years past has occupied the position of editor on the New Northwest has retired.

—Five steamers now in the local Coos Bay trade, each making daily trips between various points on the Bay and its tributaries. Rumor says there is still another to be built.

—A few forest fires have occurred in isolated places, says the Olympia Experiment, which should act as a warning to owners of valuable timber.

—James D. Fay committed suicide at Empire city on May 30th, by shooting himself through the head. Strong drink is supposed to be the cause for the rash act.

—The Harrison Street school-house, Portland was destroyed by fire on May 29th.

EASTERN.

—Little Chief and other Cheyenne Indians at Des Moines had an interview with the Secretary of the Interior last evening, when that officer plainly told them they could not be allowed to go back to Dakota. They leave Friday.

—Eben S. Ingersoll, ex-Representative in Congress from Illinois, and a brother of Robert Ingersoll, died at Washington on the 31st ult. of apoplexy.

—Reports from all the principal cities show a general observance of Decoration Day, with no especially noteworthy features.

FOREIGN.

—Grant received extraordinary honors in China. From Cheefoo he will go to Nagasaki, Japan.

—Reports from Burmah assert that the war party is gaining ground.

—The Chilean minister at London has received a telegram stating that the Chilean ship of war Emeralds became disabled, and her captain fired the magazine to prevent her falling into the hands of the enemy.

—The Council of State of the canton of Uri, Switzerland, has submitted

to the great council a law visiting willful murder and incendiarism resulting in loss of life with punishment of death, executions to be private.

—Russian grain crops are said to be suffering from devastation of a small insect which propagates very rapidly. A third of the crop in Southern Russia is threatened.

—The German reichstag passed the bill authorizing provisional levying of customs duties proposed in the tariff and tobacco bills. This includes duties on unwrought iron and petroleum.

—The arbitrator to whom was referred the question of reduction of the wages of South Yorkshire coal miners, decides against any reduction whatever. The decision affects 50,000 men and boys.

—The treaty of peace between Great Britain and Afghanistan was ratified on the 30th. A salute of 31 guns were fired in honor of the event.

—Major Cavignari will accompany the ameer of Afghanistan to Cabul, escorted by a detachment of guides.

—Mt. Aetna is in vigorous eruption. A number of brilliant balls of fire were thrown aloft, bursting like rockets and emitting showers of fire.
