NEWS OF THE WEEK.

PACIFIC COAST.

—The bodies of the three men lost in the Bullion mine, Nevada, have been recovered.

—Minnie Walton, actress, the wife of Fred. Lyster, is dead.

—Last Thursday an extra up passenger train ran against a back containing Miss Liddle Miller and Chas. Miller, near Jefferson. Miss Miller was badly hurt.

—Wheat promises from 20 to 50 bushers to the acre around Scholl's ferry.

—Worms have destroyed the current crop on Butter creek, Umatilla county.

—The railroad bridge over the North Fork in Yamhill county is 800 feet long.

—Miss Mary Strong of Salem, has been elected teacher in the LaCreole academy at Dallas this coming winter.

—Weston is building up rapidly. New side-walks are among the improvements.

A great deal of hay is being cut in eastern Oregon. Similar prudence last year would have saved many thousands of dollars worth of cattle.

—Not within the recollection of that much venerated and evenly tempered individual, the "oldest inhabitant," has such a season as this present been experienced on Puget Sound. It has been cold and backward beyond all precedent. There have been late rains, frosts, and cold nights, enough to chill the aspirations of even the American eagle himself. The fruit crop has suffered most of all. The blossoms were in many instances blighted by late frosts, while during the past few weeks, a sort of mysterious influence, commonly called blight, has fastened upon the fruit itself, and the trees are being shorn of their crop at a rapid rate.

—On the 20th inst. the wire bridge across Salmon river was swept from its moorings. A band of cattle were crossing and their weight and the force of the current broke one of the main cables. Several head of cattle and one horse were drowned. This mischief occurring at this season will greatly inconvenience the people of that section.

—The annual catalogue of the Pacific University and Tualatin Academy gives the following as the faculty for the ensuing year: Jos. W. Marsh A. M., prof. of Latin and Greek; J. D. Robb, A. M., principal of academy; W. N. Ferrin, A. M., instructor in mathematics and natural sciences; W. D. Lyman, A. B., instructor; Miss Luella Carson, preceptress; W. F. Marsh, A. B., teacher in primary department; J. W. Marsh, A. M., librarian; Miss Sarah Bowlby, teacher of music; Measures are in progress for securing a president to supply the place of the late Dr. Marsh, and in the meantime all regular classes will be provided for.

—The Comstock House which burned down at Albany recently, was insured for \$5,000, which covers the loss. J. W. Comstock was the owner. The furniture was worth about \$1,000 which belonged to Ad. Edgar and was not insured.

—Rev. Dr. Atkinson of Portland, went down to Semiahmoo, Whatcom county, last week, to dedicate a new Congregational church.

The salmon run has commenced in the lower Sound, and will set in in good earnest, it is expected, about the last of the present month. The run will probably be large; but with salmon at their present price; this will avail but little to the fishermen.

EASTERN.

—The soldiers' monument was dedicated at Trenton on the 4th.

—Hayes nominated Col. Horatio G. Wright chief of engineers, with rank of brigadier general, vice Gen. Humphreys, retired.

—A Newport dispatch says that Bancroft, the historian, was injured by being thrown from his horse.

—Rev. Herman Bisbee, pastor of Hawes Place Unitarian Church, was

taken ill after morning service, at Boston on the 6th, and died in two hours.

There were issued \$13,359,042 in standard silver dollars, and of this amount \$6,518,912 have been returned. The amount now held in the treasury is \$28,147,351. The total receipts of the government for the fiscal year ending to-day, from all sources amount to \$276,260,327. Total ordinary expenses, not including interest on public debt, amounted to \$164,598,388.

The following memorandum of appropriations has been issued by the treasury department: For the fiscal year 1877, \$123,122,611; for 1878, \$114,069,483. The appropriations for rivers and harbors were omitted this year, and the post office appropriation bill was \$3,000,000 less than in 1877. This includes the increased appropriations, and the Halifax fisheries award.

—The Senator confirmed the appointments of John Hunter, chief justice of the supreme court of Utah; Col. John Newton, to be colonel, and Maj. Geo. Mendall, lieutenant colonel of engineers.

FOREIGN.

—Poor crops are reported throughout southern Russia.

—Ex-President Grant and party arrived on the 5th at Yokohama from China.

—Cetewayo has sent messages to treat with Lord Chelmsford for peace.

—Prince Jerome Napoleon is recognized as chief of the Napoleonic dynasty.

—Advices from Port au Prince, Hayti, state that the populace fired upon the Senate. The senators fled, many being shot. The fighting continues.

—The weather is seriously embarrassing to English crops. Much American wheat will be imported.

—Newspapers are forbidden to publish Egyptian news, and the authorities have stopped telegrams from Europe to Constantinople.

—Ex-Empress Eugenie has written to Countess de Montijo, her mother, that after the funeral of the prince imperial she will spend a few months in a convent near Burgess, in Spain.

—Premier Martinez Campos, replying to interpellation was signed with Cuban insurgents, as their capitulation was honorable.

—The German parliament has voted a tax of 40 marks on coffee and six on petroleum.

—The Standard's Berlin correspondent says that the harvest in Germany is very promising.

—A dispatch from Naples reports that the ex-khedive of Egypt, Ismail Pasha, has been arrested.

—The British House of Commons is inquiring into the cause of depression in agriculture throughout the kingdom.
