NEWS OF THE WEEK.

PACIFIC COAST.

—Fire at Kalama on the 26th inst. Supposed loss \$40,000.

—A disastrous fire at Seattle on July 25. The burned district is about three hundred and fifty feet square, extending from the alley on the head of Yeiser's wharf to the water tank just above the old warehouse, and from Dexter, Horton & Co.'s wharf across to the further side of the saw mill, reducing the entire block of buildings on the south side of Mill street below the alley to ashes; also Schwabacker Bros. & Co.'s hall, and Paulson's and Harrington's warehouses, and the old saw mill. The fire originated in one of the rooms of the second story of the American House, at about 9 o'clock, and spread rapidly until its progress was checked by the determined efforts of the fire department and citizens.

—The new church recently built at Webfoot, Yamhill county, will be dedicated on the 2d of August.

—A grandson of Mr. Daniel Jones, aged about 13 years, living about 4 miles south of Salem, was drowned while swimming last Thursday.

—John Proffatt, of the law firm of Latimer, Morrow & Proffatt, died at Baldwin Hotel on the 22d, aged 32. Deceased was well known as the author of a number of valuable law works.

—The arrival of Colonel G. O. Haller from Washington, and Port Townsend, where he had been reinstated in the U. S. army after remaining under a false accusation of disloyalty for sixteen years, was celebrated by the citizens, who met the steamer Alida on her arrival and escorted the Colonel to the Central Hotel, accompanied by the Mayor, Town Council, and band, where an address of welcome was made by Dr. T. T. Minor. Salutes were fired and flags displayed generally.

—In a skirmish between an advance of Miles' command and 800 hostile Sioux, 4 Indian scouts were killed and 2 soldiers were wounded. The Indians fled on approach of Miles, and joined Sitting Bull. Three hundred lodges of Sioux are en route to Keogh to make friends with the whites.

EASTERN.

—The secretary of war cannot grant to St. Louis tents for yellow fever refugees.

—The board of health say that there is no yellow fever in the city of New York.

—The Citizens' Association will disinvest the city of New Orleans. No fever as yet.

—Four men were killed by the ditching of a gravel train struck a cow at Waukegan, Ill., on the 27th.

—The yellow fever has been officially declared an epidemic at Memphis. The poor will form a camp, and the militia put on duty.

FOREIGN.

—War between the Turks and Greeks is said to be imminent.

—The International Bank of Hamburg, with a capital of \$800,000, by unfortunate speculations has failed.

—The rivers Rhine and Seine are rising rapidly. Waters in the north are subiding, but the country is much damaged.

—A waterspout in the canton of Berne has stopped trains and whirled masses of earth about and injured crops.

—Whether a monument is to be placed in Westminster Abbey to Prince Napoleon rests entirely with Dean Stanley.

—In the house of lords on the 25th the government announced that Lord Chelmsford in negotiation with Cetewayo had consented to receive from him 1,000 rifles instead of the condition that the Zulus should lay down their arms.
