NEWS OF THE WEEK.

(From the Daily Standard.)

PACIFIC COAST.

—A Japanese man-of-war is at Victoria, 42 days from Yokohama.

—Oregon elections have gone mostly republican.

—W. H. Odell has been elected State Printer to fill the place of W. B. Carter deceased.

—M. C. George, of Portland, republican, has been elected to congress, with a handsome majority over John Whiteaker, democratic candidate and present member of congress.

—M. C. George has 150 majority in Douglas county and the republican state senators elected.

—Colfax has raised \$350 of the \$500 required of that place for the purchase of poles to use in constructing the military telegraph line.

—One lumber yard at The Dalles—says the Times—has sold 3,000,000 feet of lumber the past year, all building purposes.

—The Congregational Sabbath school at The Dalles has 182 pupils and 18 teachers, and expends \$100 annually for reading matter.

EASTERN.

—Gen. Burnside is re-elected to the senate from Rhode Island.

—The National democratic committee meets June 21st, at Cincinnati.

—The First National Bank at Newark, N. J. has failed; rumors of crookedness.

—A fire at Louisville, Ky., destroyed \$100,000 worth of property.

—Garcia has been defeated in Cuba and a number of prisoners taken.

—The bill reported from the house committee on mines and mining Thursday afternoon, to provide for the survey and disposal of mineral lands, is the bill on that subject which was framed and sent to congress by the public land commission, amended only in a few particulars of no importance.

—Sonora, Mexico, has had a revolution. This time the revolutionist was Marquess with 150 men, who defied the government 400, and when pursued by a force greater than his own he wheeled about and routed it with heavy loss. He then levied a forced loan on Magdalene and went off on another march.

—The Secretary of the treasury forwarded to-day to the senate a statement of expenses incurred by the United States in the war of the rebellion. He also specified the amount paid on the principal of the public debt thereby incurred. The statement of expenses growing out of the war from July 1, 1861, to June 30, 1879, inclusive, amounts in gross as follows: Expenditures, \$6,797,792,508; ordinary expenditures, \$609,549,123.62; specific expenditures of the war, \$6,187,243,385.

—The national greenback labor party convention at Chicago nominated Gen'l. James B. Weaver, of Iowa, for president, and B. J. Chambers, of Texas for vice president. They favor full issue of greenbacks for currency as legal tender, speedy payment of bonds, no national banks, unlimited gold and silver coinage, eight hour labor law and protection of labor, abrogation of the Burlingame treaty with China, forfeiture of unfulfilled railroad grants, denounce monopolies, favor legislation control of transportation, graduated income tax and just taxation and no restriction of suffrage. The Pomeroy ring of the party, nominated in March, also met in Chicago and did not act with the others.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, June 10th.—Special dispatches to the Nonpareil give particulars of a terrible tornado that swept through the southeastern part of Pottawattamie county last evening. The cyclone or tornado is described by an eye witness as something terrible. Wind clouds were first observed forming both east and west of Wheeling Grove, the point where the storm was most destructive, and in a short time came together. A cloud which was conical in shape came to the ground near the grove traveling eastward. The track of the storm was about half a mile in width, and it swept everything before it, demolishing farm houses, barns and other buildings, and carrying some of them bodily for hundreds of feet and then dashed them to the ground in pieces. In one place a farmer's house, surrounded by a frail fence, was picked up and then dashed to pieces in the yard, leaving every board on the fence remaining in its place. There were 15 to 20 persons killed outright, and many wounded, while others cannot be found. Those known to have been killed were Jesse Ohler, wife and two children, Wm. Pace, wife and his two children, and another child fatally injured.

—Arkell, Tufts & Co., shipping and commission merchants of New York and London have suspended owing to serious trouble in London occasioned by purchasing of iron made by their house there, but unknown to the partners until recently. Their liabilities are estimated at \$300,000 but the liabilities on account of new speculations are believed to be heavy. Exaggerated reports are current to-day, which place them as high as \$500,000.

W. U. T. Report.

Report of the Western Union Telegraph Co., for the quarter ending June 30, 1880: Net profits for quarter ending June 30th last, based upon official returns for April, nearly complete, returns for May, and estimating business for June, reserving an amount sufficient to meet the claims of the Atlantic & Pacific Telegraph Co., under existing agreements will be about \$1,201,185. Surplus April 1st, \$824,298. Total, \$2,025,483, from which, after propounding interest on bonded debt, \$107,200, construction \$250,000, sinking fund appropriations

\$20,000, patents \$119,000, and sundries \$10,000 leaves a balance of \$2,523,284. A dividend of 1% per cent, requires \$717,579, deducting which leaves a surplus after paying the dividend, of \$810,714.

FOREIGN.

—The Chinese minister has returned from Europe on his way to Peru to negotiate a treaty for protection of Chinese working on the Guano Islands.
