NEWS OF THE WEEK.

(From the Daily Standard.)
PACIFIC COAST.

—The Pioneer reunion at Portland last week was a very pleasant affair.

—John M. Morton is appointed surveyor of customs for San Francisco.

—Lyons ferry at Snake river, has now a wire rope across the river. It is on the Colville road.

—There will be abundance of fruit in Boise valley this year—probably.

—Boise City, though remotely situated, has a musical population and a great many pianos and organs.

—Three hundred families, it is said, are crossing the plains in wagons to find homes east of the Cascades.

—About 10,000 head of cattle have left the Brennan valley, Idaho, bound for the eastern market.

—A German Reformed Church is being built in the Waldo hills. Rev. J. Mullenhapt pastor.

—The Pioneer Society of Southern Oregon hold their next annual meeting Sept. 16th, at Jacksonville.

—Six thousand dollars in treasure and 25 Cassiar miner passengers arrived at Victoria on the 16th on the California.

—The Ashland Tidings says peach trees have suffered severely in Southern Oregon from the severe winter.

—Large numbers of cattle and sheep are being driven over the mountains from Douglas and Jackson counties.

—The Inland Empire says Mr. Glenn has four bricks being erected at The Dalles and E. P. Fitzgerald talks of erecting another.

—The Statesman says the place burned on State St., Salem, lately has been sold to Mr. Sam Adolph, who will erect two brick buildings there.

—Last Saturday a heavy column of smoke rising from the summit of Mount Hood was very plainly visible in Vancouver.

—They show growing wheat at Walla Walla that is four and one-half feet tall and well headed. Sample from a 150 acre field.

—Scientists who accompanied the coast survey to Sitka gathered many specimens for the Smithsonian Institute and were much pleased.

—Mr. Hugh Gordon, of Clackamas county, one of the pioneers of Oregon, died lately at the residence of W. A. Starkweather, aged 84.

—The Idaho World says: Last year this territory produced nearly \$500,000 in bullion more than Arizona, two-thirds as much as Montana and half as much as Utah.

—Notwithstanding an increase of \$40,000,000 in San Francisco property valuation this year, it is estimated that the tax levy next year will be two dollars on the hundred for city and county property.

—The Appeal says as surveyor Quinton was running a line for the narrow gauge through French Prairie a party named Thompson brought out his gun and made them leave off work.

—The Appeal says Vice President Koehler of the O. & C. R. R., and Mr. P. Shulze visited that town last week looking after railroad interests. They were to travel through the Waldo hills.

—At Coos Bay, the News says, the eleventh crib has been sunk, making a wall 550 feet long, and work will now cease for want of means. "A little more rock would materially help the harbor."

—The Ashland woolen factory is being run up to its full capacity, and turning out better goods than ever before. The proprietors are thinking of sending samples of their manufacture to the State Fair.

—Dry lake, in Lake county, about twelve miles from Tale lake, which has only held water two or three times since the country has been occupied by white people, is now a large lake in reality as well as in name.

—Large quantities of wood is still arriving at Brownsville for the woolen mills, and they are now running day and night to try and make up for so much lost time.

—Geo. E. Strong, formerly of the Oregonian, who was raised at Salem, is no longer connected with the Oregon & California Land Co., in whose employ he has been for years past.

—Ten families, composed of friends and relations from California, Massachusetts and Vermont, will locate at Hood river, the Mountaineer says, if they find desirable locations there. They are represented as well to do citizens.

—During the State Fair the steamer A. A. McCully will make daily trips between Corvallis and Salem; leaving Corvallis at 6 A. M. and arriving at Salem at 10 A. M. On returning will leave Salem at 5 P. M.

—Mrs. E. H. Marsh has recently erected a handsome monument over the grave of the Rev. President of the Pacific University, S. H. Marsh. It is of Italian marble both base and shaft, which are square, the whole being eight feet high.

—Indian villages in Alaska have been by British Columbia Indians who have carried off \$10,000 worth of valuable furs

in exchange for smuggled goods, blankets, guns and molasses chiefly. The Northwest Trading Company don't like this infraction of revenue laws.

—The Chinese consular corps at San Francisco made a formal call on the minister Angell, commissioners Swift and Trencott, who are on their way to China, inviting them to visit Chinatown, which minister Angell declined, having satisfied himself on the Chinese question at San Francisco and this coast. Civilities were exchanged.

—The Astorian says: The North Pacific Wrecking Company have removed their wrecking scow and diving apparatus down to Sand Island and yesterday commenced operations on the Great Republic. Spencer the diver, went down and examined her hold when Capt. Parker was engaged in endeavoring to float the City of Dublin. He says there was lots of merchandise in her then and he believes he can bring some of it to light yet.

EASTERN.

—The greenbackers of Ark. have convened and nominated a state ticket.

—A party of 128, bound for San Francisco and Portland, on an excursion, left Chicago June 16th.

—It is claimed that the population of the District of Columbia has increased 40,000 in ten years.

—The fire at Titusville, Pa., in the oil regions, caused a loss of a million and a half of dollars, the Acme oil company alone losing \$650,000.

—The first honorary prize at the Berlin fish exhibit was awarded to Prof. Baird, of Smithsonian Institute. The United States will receive a gold medal and an address.

—One hundred and fifty-two delegates attended a national temperance convention at Cleveland, twelve states being represented. Nomination for president, Neil Dow, of Maine; for vice president, A. H. Thomson, of Ohio.

—It is said there is grave dissension in the English cabinet; Chamberlain, president of the Board of Trade wants to withdraw because Sir Bartle Frere is continued governor of Cape of Good Hope.

—More facts have come to light concerning the defalcation of Waite, president of the First National Bank, Brattleboro, Vt., including fraudulent government bonds found among the bank's assets.

—Floods in Wisconsin have done much damage to property, and 16,000,000 of logs have broken loose; loss in Chippewa valley estimated at \$1,000,000; dams breaking, towns inundated, and houses and barns lost in the country.

—The Smith county, Kansas Pioneer of May 28th says: An immigrant train of seventy teams passed up the Republican last week en route for Oregon and Washington Territory. Two printing offices were with the outfit.

—The senate has passed a bill to relieve Wm. L. Adams, late collector of customs, and his sureties from the liability of \$13,000 dollars stolen from him while conveying it to San Francisco by steamer under orders of the treasury department; and also bills to remove the political disabilities of Abner Snead, of Oregon, and to pay W. L. White for services in the Oregon City land office.

NORTH ADAMS, MASS., June 17th.—A terrible scourge resembling dysentery is prevailing in Adams, which has, so far, baffled the skill of physicians. Over a thousand persons, old and young, have been stricken down. Physicians are busy night and day. Many cases, it is feared, will be fatal. There is little doubt that the epidemic is occasioned by impurities of the water in the reservoirs.

GOLD HILL, June 18th.—A terrible accident at the Yellow Jacket mine occurred at 11:30 o'clock, occasioned by a car load of tools falling from near the surface to the bottom, where eight men were on the skip. Four were instantly killed, namely: Neil Gallagher, Al. Temby, Timothy Wilkins and E. Whitehead. John Trezona has a thigh broken, H. Williams has an arm off, Barney Coyle and Frank Hammond are slightly injured.

FOREIGN.

—Hostilities have begun at Buenos Ayres.

—The Russian government is sending men of war to the Pacific.

—Heavy failures are announced in England, caused in part by speculations in iron.

—Cachin Pasha, of Egypt, seems to have run away with immense wealth belonging to the Khedive, acquired while minister of war and marine, and is naturalized as an Italian citizen. The Khedive has ordered his degradation and dismissal from all his offices.

LIVERPOOL, June 17th.—A London dispatch says that several French firms, having large orders from the Chinese government for rifles, have been instructed to complete them as quickly as possible.
