Campbell and Wigle Debate.

Some have a special salvation, but all are saved.

A MOVING MOUNTAIN.—The organ of the Zurich Society of Natural History publishes a curious account of the travels of the glaciers of Monte Rosa during the last sixty years. For fifty years it steadily and surely approached the town of Zermatt, moving at the rate of about three feet a week during the spring months. Its way was through pastures and grain fields, over which it passed like a devouring pestilence. Its approach was heralded by great boulders which were kept constantly moving before it. Serious apprehensions were at one time entertained for the safety of the town, which lay directly in its track. 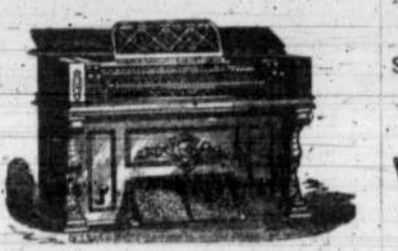
