Self-Confidence in Children.

Make the child self-conscious, and you have established an enduring feud between him and his capabilities. Henceforth his feet are an embarrassment to him, and no number of protests is adequate to the satisfactory bestial of his limbs. He fancies that all eyes are upon him, and his very blood turns purple and his cheeks flush, without just cause or provocation. It is his right to be unconscious, to develop from within outwardly as evenly and unemotionally as a flower; not to be thrust into notice by having his sayings and doings repeated in his presence, nor snubbed into silence and conscious inferiority by being constantly reminded that "children should be seen and not heard." Hardly anything is more essential in the management of children than the kindly ignoring eye that does not see too much. I pity the child that is the center of a blindly dotting or injudiciously critical family, where every saying is repeated, every act commented upon and where in consequence, naturalness is impossible. We all know how it fared with the bean, that, after being planted, was dug up every morning to see if it had begun to grow, and which after getting its head above ground, was declared out of order, and ruthlessly pulled up and turned upside down. Much of our interference with children is no less injudicious, and in its results not less mischievous. Nature abhors meddling; to revert to co-operation she yields her happiest results, but she can not be diverted from her purpose by your homilies, nor submit her plans for your revision. Hand-maiden of the Great Architect, she never loses sight of the original intention. If you thwart her it is at your peril, and she leaves on your hands the work you have spoiled.—Celia Barleigh.

IGNORANT BENEVOLENCE.—Charity is often bestowed in so careless or injudicious a manner, that it injures the feelings of the recipient more than it benefits him otherwise. For although there are scores of coarse and hardened beggars who make no attempt to work for a living, there are thousands of needy ones whose feelings are as delicate as if they abounded in wealth. A beautiful story is told of Lamartine. "One day a destitute author called upon him, and after telling him his condition, begged for some money. Lamartine, much moved by his story, gave him the amount asked. He then conducted his visitor to the vestibule. As he opened the street door the unfortunate author shivered in his coat. A sudden fit struck Lamartine, and he called out, "Monsieur, you are forgetting your overcoat," quickly took down an overcoat that was hanging in the passage, and adjusted it to his needy visitor to put it on with so much dexterity and grace that the poor man, who overcame, did not know how to refuse a gift which was so delicately offered to him.

At a certain hotel in Ohio, a large mirror is placed at the entrance of the dining hall, which is so constructed that you see yourself a thin, emaciated hungry person; but when you come out from the table and look again in the mirror your body is distended to the extremity of corpulence. So pleasant is the illusion that you go away satisfied with your well-fed, sleek condition, even if you rise hungry from the table.

MARTHA AND MARY. Luke x. 38-42. Martha is not the type of earthly-minded friends of the world, but the type of numerous Christians, who work restlessly for the cause of the Savior and their own salvation, but forget the personal possession and enjoyment of Christ for and in themselves. Mary sat before us on the other hand, as a lovely symbol of those blessed ones who have found rest with Him, and therein possess as well the ground of the highest blessedness, as also the activity most pleasing to him. The heart of the former is often as a sea which the storms have too greatly agitated for it to be able clearly to reflect the image of the sun, while with the second the light of heaven shines upon a still, clear watery mirror. Here also does Terstegen's word hold good: "Thou must not bind thyself so much to form and manner. One is not continually seeking God, another must forthwith also find him. Whoever is not in the search, he runs and works much; who hath found him, enjoys and works quietly." The more intimately these two Marthas and Marys are united with the complete quiet Mary's heart, so much the nearer do they come to the ideal of a harmonious Christian life.—Langbe.

Mr. Beecher, in his lecture-room talk on the early stages of Christian life, says: "A student, when he goes to the Academy, does not feel that he has his education. He scarcely feels so when he graduates. But many feel, when they join the church, that they have got religion, as the saying is; whereas they have merely got started, they have merely joined a class, as it were. They have their model before them; but all the rest of their life is to be occupied in coming up to it, in adjusting themselves to it according to it."
