A Hearty Response to the Appeal — \$70.63 Has Been Sent.

The generous citizens of Lane county are making a hearty response to the appeal for funds made by the India Famine committee of the Eugene Divinity School and the U of O Y M C A. The following sums are reported:

A draft for the above amount was sent the Christian Herald, New York, May 1. In addition to the above there are at least \$20 pledged which will be paid shortly. In nearly every one of the above communities committees are at work securing more funds. The committee makes no hysterical appeal for money. It merely sets the truth, as well as it has apprehended it, before the people, and allows the audience to take what action it sees fit.

In the famine '77, ten million people died, and '97, sixteen million, and unless help is sent at once, at least twenty millions must die this year. The Indian government is working heroically and is doing all in its power to check the famine and the plague which is sure to follow. The Herald states that two cents will save a life for one day and that two dollars will save a life throughout the famine. No one should not fail to give, if he cannot give much, a mite from us may be a fortune to them.
