SHOULD COMPLY

Clerk Lee Should Register the Rejected Voters at Once.

LAW UNTO HIMSELF

County Clerk Lee when he refuses to register thirty legally qualified electors is guilty of attempting to disfranchise American citizens, which is no small matter.

Lawrence Harris commenced by telling of the bad legislation passed by the Oregon legislature during the last ten years, and then took up one-third of his time in telling of particular demerits which had voted for a few bad or doubtful measures. But he forgot to tell the audience that the legislatures for said period were republicans at the ratio of three to one. Then he gave a 25 minute talk upholding Tongue for voting the Porto Rico bill which makes the poor people of that island pay 15 per cent duty to have their products carried into the old United States.

Mr Skipworth followed in a masterly speech. He took up the last several republican legislatures and applied the whip to them vigorously. He talked on county affairs showing the enormity of the situation.

CLERK LEE.

He Proposes to Disfranchise Citizens.

HERE'S THE NAMES.

County Clerk Lee holds that all registrations that were not in his office on May 15, 1900, previous to 5 o'clock p.m., shall be rejected, notwithstanding the clerks of every county in the state, except Lane, have held otherwise. Why should he reject 30 names registered on May 15 by registration officers throughout the county with exactly the same power as himself. And again, when the notary public handed in his work to Deputy Hamlin on May 16 (the registrations having been made before May 15 before 5 p.m.) and was protesting to said deputy against clerical authority County Clerk Lee appeared on the scene and grossly insulted said notary in the courthouse, owned and paid for by the taxpayers of Lane county.

The GUARD has no idea of the politics of those rejected by Lee, but justice and fairness demand that they forthwith be placed on the register.

CODLIN MOTHS.

Can Be Kept Off Apple Trees Without Spraying.

The following letter to the Eugene Weekly Guard shows how to keep codlin moths off apple trees without spraying. The moths go up the tree, crawl under the bandage, and once each five days the moths accumulating are killed, and the cloth replaced. The writer of the letter is a successful orchardist with 200 acres in apples, and states one man does all the work:

WATSONVILLE, May 16, 1900.

E. H. INGHAM, Eugene—Dear Sir: In regard to bandage for moth, I take a piece of a common sack or any kind of cloth, about eight inches wide and double it, and put it around the tree so that both ends meet, and make them fast with a tack on the upper edge, put it around the body of the tree about two feet from the ground. I look at the bandage about every five days. If this plan is attended to properly, I think you will save ninety-five per cent of your apples.

SPLENDID SHOWING

Sheriff Withers Has Saved to Lane County Thousands of Dollars.

CONSTABLE FEES CUT DOWN.

Sheriff Withers has made a splendid showing. He has saved to the taxpayers thousands of dollars in the expense in which he has conducted his office. He has been a busy man from July 4 1898, when he was sworn into office to hunt down the murderers of old John Linn until today. Think of it, he has personally arrested 40 men, of whom he executed 1 and took 16 to the penitentiary; then he hunted down such men as Pete McDaniel, who robbed the jewelry store at Junction.

Again, in tax matters he has made the best collector ever known. Locally he (Withers) has reduced the Eugene constable's office from a sinecure to a place not worth having, thus saving to the taxpayers of Lane county many dollars.

CONSTABLE FEES.

By request of numerous readers we publish the amount received by the Eugene Constable's office of the Eugene district from the time ex-Sheriff Johnson went into office (July 1, 1894) to the time Constable Fleeman resigned, last month on account of the 'starvation fare' received, made possible by Sheriff Withers' activity as an officer.

LINTON'S FEES.

LIQUOR LAND OUTRAGE.—L P Tallman of Meadow postoffice, on the Siuslaw wagon road, informs us that Northern Pacific Railroad lumber land cruises are in that section, making selections of timber lands in lieu of the worthless lands surrendered by that corporation in the Mount Ranier National Park reserve. The Northern Pacific Railroad has less than fifty miles of road in Oregon, yet it is allowed to select lands in the state at will. Such selections mean the tying up of the lands for an indefinite period.
