The Register is Able at All Times to Invent Fairy Tales.

ARRESTS MADE.

The Register is able on a moment's notice to give "figures" on any proposition. It has been driven from "post to pillar" but still it comes up smiling.

The GUARD published that Sheriff Withers had made about 40 arrests since being in office; and this is correct. The total number of arrests in the county since July 1, 1898, will figure up about 80; and the commitments to the county jail were 60. However, we did not state this heretofore as we knew the Register would "explain" that Sheriff Withers had neglected his duty if it had to tell one hundred falsehoods. But this morning that paper was trapped. Naturally thinking that if Withers had arrested 40 criminals that was all the arrests made during the past 22 months in the county it then publishes a list, and states that those were all the arrests and all the cases that have come before the circuit court of Lane county.

To show its false statements we publish some official records. It even omitted from the list criminals sent to the penitentiary as follows:

"John H. Hay; larceny in a store. Sentenced to the penitentiary on March 11, 1899, by Judge Hamilton, for two years.

"Ivan Kidwell; larceny in a store. Sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of two years by Judge Hamilton, on March 11, 1899."

It also omits a number of names that served terms in the county jail.

Such wanton recklessness in statements made to injure an efficient officer is receiving the condemnation of hundreds of republicans.

THE RUST SCARE.

Comparisons With the Previous Rust Year, 1879.

Farmers are fearful of rust, 1879 was the only rust year that ever afflicted the Willamette Valley to any appreciable extent. If comparisons indicate anything, the present year of rust is groundless.

The 1879 spring was an unusually wet one and late. On the Fourth of July (there was a celebration in Eugene that day) a heavy general rain fell over the entire valley. Then, following hot weather ensued and many farmers hardly got enough poor, shriveled up wheat off their farms for chicken feed. Many fields went uncut. The spring wheat only, was ruined, fall and winter wheat producing part of a crop, though of poor quality. But little fall wheat, was grown these days. A walk through one of those abandoned rusted wheat fields would color the clothes as if sprinkled with brick dust. Many farmers and business men were badly crippled financially, if not broken-up by the year that promised a rich harvest, but gave no returns for the toil of the husbandman.

That was the only rust year of any importance in the history of the valley. Weather conditions and the rust period as determined by that year, lead us to believe that the present fear is without sufficient cause.

Sad Fate of the Cannon Brothers

Some weeks ago the GUARD made mention of the sad death, by burning of William and Walter Cannon, sons of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Cannon, of Henleyville Tehama county, California, and nephews of Mrs. S. Handsaker of this city.

We are permitted to make the following extracts from a letter just received, written by Mrs. Sarah Lewis, sister of the two young men, also clippings from their local paper.

"My parents are so prostrated with grief," says Mrs. Lewis, "that I write of the sad event for them. This will have a blight in our lives that can never be removed. The terrible affair has cast a shadow on the entire community. We shall never know just how the fire started, but perhaps from a little fire in the fireplace. Walter's wife was not at home on the fatal night, having gone to visit her sister Cousin Eugene Rouse who was staying with the boys that night, says they retired soon after 9 o'clock, and he was awakened in the night by the clock falling to the floor caused by the fire. He awoke his companions and it is thought that Willie made an effort to secure some valuable books. His body terribly burned was found lying across the hearth. Eugene pulled Walter out through a window, and both then ran one-half mile to the nearest house.

Walter suffered greatly from the fearful burns and died in three days. The dear boys were buried in the same grave, and the largest funeral procession ever seen in this county followed them to the Passaventa cemetery."

LINN AND LANE.

A Former Lane County Citizen Writes On This Subject.

The Lebanon Express Advance of May 22, edited by George Alexander has this:

"If Lane county has gone ahead of Linn in population it is about the only thing in which she does lead, and her increase in population can be accounted for in the fact that mining and lumbering are being engaged in more extensively than in this county. Another thing in which she leads is her high tax levy of 35 mills to Linn's 14.5, and her debt of \$118,000; while Linn has no debt at all. The Lane county court is more progressive than the Linn county court in one way only, and that is in the matter of extravagance and in being manipulated by the mob. They are good republicans, who stand in with all the schemes to help the boys. (The farmers pay the freight.) We know from personal knowledge that the roads and bridges of this county are just as good as those of Lane county."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

Questions Which Are to Be Voted June 30 and July 4th.

At the request of a number of subscribers of the GUARD, we print the constitutional amendments which are to be voted upon at the coming election. They are embodied in the following resolutions:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed: That Section 10 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby abrogated and in lieu thereof Section 10 of Article XI shall be as follows: Sec 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to any amount, including present existing indebtedness, in the aggregate exceeding five percentum on the value of the taxable property therein, to be ascertained by the last assessment for state or county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 7.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:

ARTICLE I.

The elective franchise in this State shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 13.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, in lieu of Section 10 of Article 7, be and the same is hereby proposed to-wit: The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of Supreme and Circuit Judges in district classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the Supreme Court, who shall not perform circuit duty; and the other class shall consist of as many Circuit Judges as may be deemed necessary, who shall hold full terms without allotment, and shall take the same oath as the Supreme Judges. The Legislative Assembly may create as many circuits as are necessary.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 10.

Resolved by the house, the senate concurring: That the following amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon be and is hereby proposed: That the constitution be amended by adding Article 19, as follows:

ARTICLE XIX.

Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs, of storage basins for the purpose of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, ditches, flumes or pipes to convey water to the place of use for any useful, beneficial or necessary purposes, or for drainage of mines or the workings thereof, by means of roads, railroads, tramways, cuts, tunnels, shafts, hoisting works, dump or other necessary means to their complete development of the natural resources of the state or preservation of the health of the inhabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use, and subject to the regulation and control of the state.

Section 2. The right to appropriate the unappropriated waters of any natural stream to beneficial uses shall never be denied.

Section 3. The use of all waters now appropriated for sale, rental or distribution, also of all waters originally appropriated for private use, but which, after such appropriation, has heretofore been or may hereafter be sold, rented or distributed, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the state in a manner prescribed by law, but the right to use and appropriate such waters shall be subject to such provisions of law for the taking of private property for public or private use as is provided in Section 18, Article 1, of the constitution of the state of Oregon.

Section 4. The right to collect taxes or compensation for the use of water supplied to any county, city, town or water district or inhabitants thereof, is a franchise, and cannot be exercised except by authority of and in a manner prescribed by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2.

Proposing an amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon by repealing Section 35 of Article 1. "Resolved by the house, the senate concurring: That Section 35, of Article 1, of the constitution, be and hereby is repealed. No free negro or mulatto residing in this state at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall come, reside, or be within this, or hold any real estate, or make any contracts, or maintain any suit therein; and the legislative assembly shall provide by penal laws for the removal by public officers of all such negroes and mulattos, and for their effectual exclusion from the state, and for the punishment of persons who shall bring them into the state, or employ or harbor them."

CANCELLED.—The appointment of Hon. B. F. Ramp to speak at Jasper, Wednesday afternoon, May 30, has been cancelled.

WATER COMPANY.

Change of Power Is Being Arranged For.

Work around the pumping station of the Eugene Water Company is progressing very satisfactorily. One of the old pumps has been removed, and the large new one will be placed in position by the end of another week. Messrs. Midgley & Chambers are rushing the work necessary to transmit their water power to the pumping station. The large tower near the railroad is being placed in position, and the turbine wheel will be located under the Midgley shaft and door factory. When this is all completed the steel cables which transmit the power will be ordered. Superintendent McMurphy, of the Water Company, states to a GUARD reporter today that they expected to be using the new power by July 1.

CONNECTION SEVERED.

J. M. Abrams Resigns as Cashier of Lane County Bank.

J. M. Abrams, the well known banker and business man, has resigned his position as cashier of the Lane County bank. Mr. Abrams has been connected with this institution for 10 years, and during this time as well as formerly has been identified with the progressive interests of Eugene and Lane county.

In conversation with a GUARD representative Mr. Abrams stated that he would probably go to the Cape Nome gold fields this summer, and is arranging his financial interests to end. His brother and nephew, W. H. and Tom Abrams are already on their way that point. The many friends of Mr. Abrams wish success in his future efforts.

PAID IN.

Lane County Is Square With the State.

Lane county has paid its state tax, and can now put a little money in its own pocket. Treasurer Patterson, to State Treasurer Moore today \$16,880.33, being the full amount of the \$33,760.66 assessed against Lane county.

CLERK LEE READ.—Albany Democrat: "The County Clerk, of Lane county, holds contrary to every other clerk in the state, it is said, that no name should be registered not received before 5 o'clock on the 15th. The law is plain that registration before a notary or justice by that time and sent forthwith to the clerk is sufficient."

CLERK LEE'S CASE.

E. W. Bingham, Father of the Law, Thinks the Delayed Electors Were in Time.

County Clerk Lee is clearly at fault in not registering the 30 names sent him and he should now place them on the register. "Delays are dangerous." We will state the rejected registrations were received by Clerk Lee as soon as mails could bring them.

We herewith print the opinion of Mr. E. W. Bingham, of Portland, the father of the law, and a lawyer of acknowledged reputation:

PORTLAND, Or., May 23, 1900.

L. CAMPBELL, Esq., Eugene, Or.: DEAR SIR:—In reply to your letter of the 22nd, asking: "Is it the intent of the Registration law to permit names to go on the books which were received by notaries and justices up to 5 p. m., Tuesday, May 15th?"

I give it as my construction of the law as follows:

By Sec. 9, of the act, electors may register by making oath with two witnesses upon blank A, before a notary public or justice of the peace, "which shall be duly certified by the notary public or justice of the peace, and forthwith filed with the county clerk of the county."

By Sec. 10, "Upon receipt of said written application or affidavit * * * the clerk shall forthwith register the elector in the proper precinct. * * *

By Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of every elector between the first Monday in January and 5 o'clock p. m. of 15th May, * * * to register with some notary or justice or with the county clerk, in accordance with this act.

It seems plain enough to me from sections, that if the elector completes his affidavit before the justice or notary before 5 o'clock p. m. of May 15th, be the elector, has done his duty in the matter.

It then becomes the notary or justice's duty to "forthwith" file the affidavit with the clerk. It might be sent by mail to the clerk or be carried to the clerk and if that is promptly done the clerk should give it within a very few hours after 5 o'clock p. m. of May 15th, even if the affidavit was made before the justice or notary just before 5 o'clock p. m. of May 15th. To allow full 24 hours would cover most cases. But to allow the regular time consumed in traveling in the mail between the points would be more reasonable.

I should therefore conclude that the justice or notary should be required to start all such affidavits by messenger or mail on or before the evening of May 15th; and that the clerk should receive and file and enter upon the registers, all that were delivered to him or received by him by mail, provided they were so started.

If the clerk keeps receiving and entering that long after May 15th, I think he would be carrying out the intent. But after waiting the time it should require to come by mail from the locality of the justice or notary, the clerk should close his registers and refuse to receive a file any arriving later. Because, if they arrive later it must be because of the fault of the justice or notary, and because a justice or notary is in fault is no reason why the clerk should be led into fault of into keeping open his registers too long.

Sec. 13, directs the clerk to close his registers at 5 o'clock p. m. of May 15th. He should not register electors applying to him after that hour. But I would allow the preceding sections 5, 9, and 10 to control this provision to the extent above stated. That is, so that the clerk should receive and file and enter all such affidavits, provided they were made by the justice or notary "forthwith"—(say not later than the evening of May 15th) to him, or if they were forwarded in like manner by messenger.

A tardy messenger or justice or notary should not extend the time beyond this.
