

CHINESE ARMS AND THE MISSIONARY QUESTION.

Prof Goodwin Smith, of Toronto, writer and recognized authority on modern international law, gives the opinion that the Chinese have a right to be left alone in possession of the country they have occupied for four thousand years.

"Would the Chinese be a goodly for a modern equipped army?" "Through sanguinary annihilation, they are utterly incapable of it. At the same time they are rapidly equipped with all modern appliances of war and in the case of a conflict they would be met by the million."

"What about the missionaries in China?" He was asked.

"One thing is clear—all the missionaries should be expelled at once to withhold the power of the state, or if they already have been expelled, they should be removed from the country as did the early missionaries, on their own side. It is unnecessary that a religion of peace and good will should be made, as you often have been in the hands of the missionaries, a source for kindling the flames of anarchism etc."

STARVING IN MIDST OF PLENTY.

The result of the absorption of labor by capital is being painfully illustrated in British India. Millions are starving, though there is plenty of food products in the granaries of the speculators. The starving people have no money, but they are permitted to earn a little hawking and peddling, and other arduous labor for the beautification of public roads and public property. These are the wages they receive:

A male-headed family... 3 cents per day
Women... 2 cents per day
Children... 1 cent per day

No work no pay, and no money no grain. Most because of those who cannot work can only be imagined. A clergyman says that a beautiful, shapely girl-child can be bought for thirty cents, and an English correspondent in the London Chronicle complains that these people "love to hoard money and even try to lay by one-fourth of a cent of their daily wage for luxuries."

GET THE MOST FOR THEIR MONEY.

Capt. Rouse steamer shipping rates for cattle from Portland are \$100 per "head." In consequence the shipper looks about for the biggest cattle to be found. The same conservatism applies to shipments of other live stock. The Oregonian tells about the cattle large-sized animals that were shipped the other day on the freight and stock steamer Iroquois:

"Agent Buchanan, of the California & Oregon Steamship Company is amused at the conservatism of the cattle, sheep and hogs that Oregon produces. He says that when the freight and stock steamer was being gotten ready for her trip to the Midwest, the steers were made six inches wider than is customary. When the cattle began to arrive at the docks there was enormous difficulty in stowage-loading them. Out of 47 steers, there was not one weighing less than 1600 pounds, and many tipped the beam at 2300 lbs. The 290 sheep were of an average of 189 pounds each. The hogs, 25 in number, were 'condensed' as well as porker, and were of immense size. As Mr. Buchanan had six months' experience in shipping cattle from Seattle to Slagway, he saw many large ones, but none so huge as these that the Despatch carried out."

Answering the queries of a correspondent, who asks, among other things, "Can a daily newspaper be published in accord with the teachings of Christ?" The New York Sun asserts that, as a matter of fact, newspapers are just as much in such accord as is any other form of business or the conduct of mankind generally. Indeed, says the Sun, newspapers are governed by principles more elevated than those which the run of men apply to their conduct. Two New Instructors Elected-- Assistant for Prof. Lachman.

PROF. McELROY RESIGNS. The Board of Regents of the University of Oregon met in this city this morning at 8:30 o'clock.

Present--Judge R. S. Bean, president; J. J. Walton, Secretary; Guy Hovey, treasurer; Regents Dolph, Butler, Beckman, Hamilton and Friendly.

The following officers were re-elected: R. S. Bean, president; J. J. Walton, secretary, and Guy Hovey, treasurer. Prof. E. B. McElroy resigned his professorship.

Two instructors, to be recommended by Dr. Strong, was ordered employed. They are: Joseph Schafer at \$600 per year and Henry D. Sheldon or M. Triplett at \$1,200 per year. After routine business the board adjourned.

REPUBLICANS AFTER FUNDS. Special to the Guard. LONDON, June 14. - The war department has received word that General Roberts had driven General Duda from his position. It is stated no casualties occurred. It is further reported that the Natal army is in touch with Roberts' troops, which is considered a decided advantage to the English movement.

REPUBLICANS WORKING. Special to the Guard. WASHINGTON, June 14. - The Post states that the republican congressional committee is trying to select part of the extra pay recently voted the employes of congress, to be used in the national campaign. Many of the employes have refused to let go.

Special to the Guard. SHANGHAI, June 14. - Thirty thousand troops are before the city with their arms trained on the American, Japanese and English legations. The troops were asked for by Yuan Shikai.

A riot has taken place at Yuen Na Fu. The Catholic missions have been destroyed but the missionaries are safe. British troops are on hand and will protect property.

AMERICANS AT WORK. Special to the Guard. WASHINGTON, June 14. - Admiral Kaut's wires the department that 3700 troops are en route to Peking to relieve the legations. The veterans are commencing to start the move. Most of the troops are Russian and English, but nearly all nations are represented. The Russians are sending troops to Port Arthur.

THE BOXES. Special to the Guard. TRINIDAD, June 14. - It is reported that the boxes last night burst the Trinidad station, before the troops arrived.

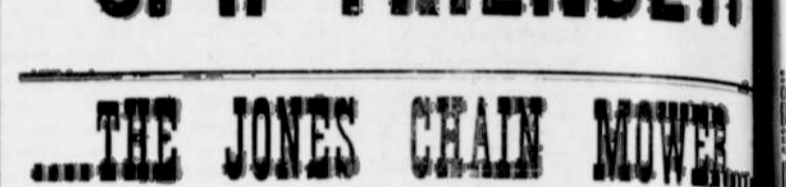
