UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Commencement Day Exercises This Morning.

END OF A PROFITABLE MEET.

Daily Guard, June 14

The twenty-fourth annual com-
mencement of the University of
Oregon, was held in Villard Hall
today, the exercises beginning at 9:30
o'clock. This was the final of the best
year the University has ever seen. The
student body is enthusiastic, the
alumni are patriotic and the people of
Oregon are looking with pride to this
institution which is the prime factor
in the classical education of the sons
and daughters of this fair Western
state.

A new epoch has arrived for the
University. Dr. Frank Strong, pres-
ident, is the man who will make
educational history for Oregon. Un-
der his leadership every effort to build
up the school and at the same time
advance the public schools of the state
to a high school grade, he inspires the
same enthusiasm among the students
and people of the state. Aided by a
corps of instructors, the best in the
history of the school, President Strong
is able to insure the students thorough
work in any branch to which they
may elect. It is predicted very con-
servatively that at least 100 more
students will be enrolled next year
than were on the lists this year.

PROGRAM

The exercises were opened with the
spinning song from the "Flying
Dutchman," Wagner by the Treble
Clef Club.

Rev. H. S. Templeton, of Portland,
U. O. '96, delivered the invocation.

Miss Rita Hansen sang a double
number, "The Quest," Eleanor Smith,
and "Madrigal," Victor Harris.

John Fraser Watts, of the school of
law, was to represent his class on the
program, but unfortunately was unable
to be present.

Professor Irving M. Glen sang "Sail
Ho" Patri. As is usual the popular
singer was received with prolonged
applause, and was forced to appear the
second and third times.

Miss Clara Young played "Soaring"
from Schumann, and was received
with applause.

"The Secret of Successful States-
manship." The secret of successful
statesmanship belongs to one man and
not to another because only he is
worthy to possess statesmanship who
has the right end in view, strength of
character, necessary knowledge of
affairs and the inspiration of his
times. In the combination of specific
aim and all the endowments which
make the man, lies the statesman's

scientious, well devoted mind; lives
dedicated to service—yes, sacrificed,
even in the solution of these momen-
tous questions of sovereignty, empire
and liberty.

HOMER D. ANGELO.

"Passing of Barbarism." Science
has pointed out the goal toward which
nature has tended from the beginning.
Geology has explained the formation
of the earth as a fit abode for the
human race; biology has followed
evolution from the primate through
myriad forms to the one consummate
form, man, in which physical devel-
opment gave way to psychical and man
became the "wilder of the force of
nature. With this change from the
physical evolution in man to the
psychical began the contest between
barbarism and civilization, a contest
between inhumanity on the one hand
and all charities on the other.

The speaker followed the struggles
of man, the lust for power and greed
of gain. The lowly Nazarene came
and through his influence the Anglo-
Saxon stands today the leader of
progress, the guardian of peace. It
knocks at the door of barbarous Asia
and is hastening the day when Bar-
barism shall be gone, when the king-
doms of heaven shall be the kingdoms
of earth.

"The Secret of Successful Statesman-
ship." Human progress depends upon
the institution of government.
Whether civilization shall advance or
retard, conquer or yield to barbarism,
depends upon the character of its polit-
ical organization. Its area can be
extended only with that sovereignty
which is its protection and inspiration.
Liberty with law, civilization with
empire, is the order of the world's
advancement.

The secret of successful statesman-
ship proclaims itself in the establish-
ment of a free republic. Defying the
possibilities of centralized government,
fearless in the menace of imperialism,
with faith sublime in the destiny of
our race, we extend our sovereignty,
our liberty and civilization; and the
guiding star of our statesmanship is
Union of men under the sovereignty
of law, and civilization expanded to
the limits of the world.

VICTOR L. MOLT.

"American Leadership."
American leadership is unique in the
world's history. From the beginning,
this nation was composed of a peculiar

people—men who dared to have
thoughts and convictions in countries
where to think was a crime. Men
who believed that the soldier should
be only an armed citizen, that govern-
ment officials should be public serv-
ants, and that the voice, of the com-
mon people should not be ignored in
the affairs of state.

The speaker reviewed the mental

American government, and to perpet-
uate it—a mighty movement to a
liberty-loving Father. The appear-
ance of those great unsolved problems
of the Pacific, the presence in our
nation of those mighty forces essential
to leadership, seem to tell us that
God has chosen America to sit as a
leader in the councils of the nations.

MARY LORA MCALISTER.

"With Your Shield, or On It."

The farewell of the Spartan mother
to her son; bound for the war, was
the oration title of Miss McAlister.
There has always been in man's
nature this lofty motive of consecration
and sacrifice that has compelled him
to risk all to win his goal, to be true
to his ideal. It is the mountain peak
of his life toward which he climbs,
on which he sees the rose lights of the
sunrise; it is the calling of the divine
beyond him to the divine within him.

The speaker referred to the bravery
of the boys of the Second Oregon, and
the loyal patriotism of the mothers to
show that "with your shield, or on it,"
is a motto as potent for inspiration
now as in the time of Leonidas, re-
membered at Marathon as readily as
Thermopylae. Man today recognizes
a broader ideal of duty than did the
Spartan. A duty not only to country
but also to himself and to his fellow
man and above all to his Maker.
The speaker closed with a plea for edu-
cation and protection of the natives
of our outlying colonies.

ARTHUR B. WALTZ.

"From a Century of Material Ac-
complishment to a Century of Strenuous Ideal-
ism." The ruling idea of the Nine-
teenth century has been material gain.
Forests have been leveled, great cities
have multiplied, and colonization
enterprises have reached earth's
remotest bound. Out of a century in
which the greatest achievement has
been wealth production and the ruling
spirit a selfish materialism, conditions
have arisen leading to the bold applica-
tion of broader standards. The
relation of man to man, and of
nation to dependency, has greatly
changed with a few years. The new
motive for expansion is universal good
government. The heathen lands will
contribute towards the federation of
the world. Anglo-Saxon progress will
bring to strenuous usefulness the
energies of every clime. Science,
education and religion cooperate to
inspire to high aims and to furnish
means for their accomplishment. The
sum of righteousness quickens the life
slumbering forces that shall over-
come the world.

The Treble Clef club sang Ebb and
Flow, by Lamotte, closing the musical
numbers of the program.

Hon. C. E. Henderson '93, of Bloom-
field, Ind., Hon. F. W. Mulkey, '96 of Port-
land, and Rev. J. A. Cleland, of this city,
judges of orations for awarding of the
Falling and Beekman prizes, who were
publicly instructed regarding their
duties by President Strong, then re-
turned to compare markings for the
award. They decided as follows:

Falling prize, \$150—Homer D. Angell
Beekman prize, \$100—Miss Mary
McAlister.

The announcement was heartily re-
ceived and appeared to receive the ap-
probation of the audience.

In conferring the degrees President
Strong took occasion to say a few words
to the class. He said in part:

PRESIDENT STRONG.

"In the orations of today there has
been a great deal said about leadership.
The U. O. presumes to send to the world,
through its graduates, people who are
capable of acting as leaders in every
part of life. It expects much of the
graduates—purity of life and cleanli-
ness of living. But it expects more.
It expects these people of education to
live in and be leaders in the higher
walks of life, and not be unambitious
as to drop into those positions for which
a person with one-tenth of their train-
ing is qualified.

"May God protect the University of
Oregon from graduates whose highest
aspirations are money, food, clothes
and shelter. We believe that Oregon
is to be the center of the new civiliza-
tion, of its trade, and of its manufac-
tures, and if this is to be so the gradu-
ates of its greatest schools must take
the lead in all these lines of growth.

"The tendency of education is to be
under the control of the state, and
thereby rests a grave responsibility.
The state should build up its greatest
educational institution, but it cannot
afford to do so unless influence and
growth of the graduates warrant the
expenditure. The students should
sacrifice to the law of life. They must
be not only persons of power, but per-
sons of moral power."

President Strong then conferred

WALDO SKINNER.

**Our Oldest Citizen Passed Away
This Morning.**

Waldo Skinner, after a brief illness,
died in this city, this morning, aged
91 years, 8 months and 1 day. He was
probably the oldest citizen of Lane
county.

He was born in Woodstock, Conn.,
October 13, 1838. He came from Iowa
to Oregon in 1883. During his lifetime
he lived in a number of states. His
only surviving child is George H.
Skinner. Waldo H. Skinner, deceased
son, formerly resided here as also did
his daughter, Beulah, wife of T. W.
Martin.

The funeral will take place from
the residence of W. F. Martin, Friday,
June 15, at 2 o'clock. Interment in
the Mulkey cemetery.

the chivalry of the veterans during the
southern campaign. Comrade Chap-

RESOLUTIONS PASSED.
