

THE WHEAT SITUATION.

The Orange Judd Farmer, which is generally on the bullish side of the market, has the following regarding the wheat situation:

Our annual estimate of the amount of old wheat still on farms July 1, is of especial interest this year, in view of the probable shortage of the wheat crop of the present year. The county estimates of our local reporters when carefully consolidated into state averages show a moderate holding of old wheat, smaller than last year, but rather larger than seemed probable earlier in the season. The amount reported to Orange Judd Farmer as so held is 60,917,000 bushels, against 65,600,000 bushels at this date a year ago, and 25,000,000 bushels in '98. On March 1, we reported the farm reserve of wheat at 164,000,000 bushels, a figure larger than was reported by other authorities, but the movement since that date and the present returns of farm stocks indicate that this figure was somewhat below the mark, and that our estimate of 565,000,000 bushels for the crop of '99, while higher than that made by any other recognized authority, was from 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 bushels below the actual production. It is interesting to note in this connection that the wheat movement from the spring wheat crop of Minnesota and the Dakotas indicates that our estimate for the crop of these three states was too low by about the figure above indicated as the shortage on the whole crop.

The farm stock now reported, while larger than is ordinarily carried over, is by no means burdensome, and in connection with the admitted wheat shortage this year at home and abroad, places American farmers in what must be a promising situation. With farm and commercial stock of perhaps 140,000,000 bushels, a crop promise of not exceeding 600,000,000 bushels, we have a supply of 640,000,000 bushels. Domestic requirements will absorb 410,000,000 leaving 230,000,000 export demand, and stocks to be carried over July 1, next year. Our export requirement can hardly be expected to fall below 200,000,000 bushels in view of the fact that France will, in the coming year, be an importer, and to meet such a demand it will be necessary to sweep wheat bins closer than for many years, and closer than can be done except under the stress of highly satisfactory prices for wheat.

WILL STRENGTHEN TICKET.

When Mr Fountain opened the jail about 6 a. m., to give the prisoner a hot cup of coffee, morning hash, etc, young Winslow greeted him with the glad hand and yanked him inside the jail, locked the door and passed on out, leaving the officer to enjoy the bounteous spread all by his lonesome. However, the deputy-sheriff managed to arouse the neighborhood by his plaintive cries for help, and was soon set at liberty. In the meantime the jail-bird had reached Link river, north of town, and started to swim across at the mouth of the lake, and was overtaken by parties in a rowboat and brought back to jail, much refreshed by the morning exercise.

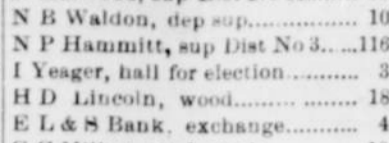
