### HARRISON'S VIEWS.

[Helena (Mont) Cor St. Louis Republic.]  
The Livingston (Mont) Post, a copy of which has just been received here, says:

Ex-President Harrison and party came out of the Yellowstone Park last Friday evening and returned east that evening. The ex-president was seen by a Post man, and in response to an inquiry as to the political situation, gave it as his opinion that the republican party would carry the election this fall, but admitted that Bryan would receive a heavier vote in the east this year than he did in 1896. He thought the chances of the great democratic leader in Indiana much better than they ever had been and said it would not

surprise him should the state go democratic this fall. The ex-president did not think the republican party had pursued the right course with regard to the trust question, and thought the administration was playing fast and loose with the people on the matter. He regards the administration, however, as having been a wise one for the most part, but admits that several grievous mistakes have been made in handling the reins of government.

### POLITICAL BATTLE GROUNDS.

Already it is clear that the great political battles of this year's campaign are to be fought in the states of New York, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota and Michigan. The importance of each of these states may be understood by a glance at their respective voting power in the electoral college:  
New York.....36 Ohio.....23  
Illinois.....24 Michigan.....14  
Indiana.....15 Minnesota.....9  
Kentucky.....13 Maryland.....8  
This totals up a total of 142, being a little more than 80 short of the number necessary to elect a president and a vice president.

Congressman Rhea, democrat, whose title to his seat in congress as a representative of the ninth Virginia district has been sustained against the contest of General Walker, the republican candidate, is a resident of the town of Bristol, which enjoys the somewhat peculiar distinction of being in two states. One part of it is in Virginia; another part lies in Tennessee. The main street of Bristol is the state line, and it is a very convenient one from all accounts for those persons desiring to escape from the jurisdiction of one state to the other.

### WONT STAND.

A Washington dispatch to the New York Herald is as follows:  
L N Haberoom, who for several years has been connected with the republican congressional campaign committee in the preparation of German literature and in sending campaign matter to the German newspapers of the United States, has come out today in a statement repudiating the republican party and declaring for Bryan.

Mr Haberoom declares against imperialism. He says the foreign policy of the republican party makes the United States a world power and embroils us in all the quarrels of the world and entangles us in foreign alliances. According to Mr Haberoom this country is already entangled in an unwritten alliance with Great Britain. "The republican party," says he, "now stands for imperialistic expansion and is already busy cultivating the spirit of militarism. The democratic party has earnestly, clearly and forcibly pronounced against imperialism with its resultant evils and for the preservation of the republic and the constitution. The issue is thus made up, and I consider it my plain duty to help maintain the republic by such efforts as I can make, humble though they are."

"As to 16 to 1, that has no terrors for us. We have the authority of the republican leaders and the republican party that the senate will safeguard our present monetary system at least till March 3, 1905. With this assurance before me, not to mention others, I am astounded at the frantic efforts now being made by the management of the republican party, most of the republican press, and by the republican president in his speech of acceptance, to frighten the American people with an issue that is not now alive, in hopes of obscuring the greatest of all issues put before the people since 1865; I shall say nothing of the issue of trusts, of which the president has not designed to speak a single word in his speech of acceptance, so rich in the glowing pictures of the great happiness of the American people under present republican rule.

"These reasons for my support of the democratic ticket in what I consider the most serious crisis that has ever threatened the life of the republic will, I trust, be understood and appreciated by my friends."

### Turned the Joke to Account.


