LANE COUNTY FORGING AHEAD.

There is no better index as to the comparative standing and progress of the counties of the state than the school apportionment and census of the persons of school age therein. The recent annual apportionment of school fund interest made by State Treasurer Moore gives the leading counties the following amounts, based on population between four and twenty years of age:

WHY GERMANY PROGRESSES.

Richard Guenther, the United States consul-general to Germany, sends the state department another very valuable "pointer" as to why Germany is springing forward as a world-power. He says that there are in Germany 861 schools and institutes, distributed in 605 places, and using 1,514 workshops in manual training.

This is only one phase of the widespread scientific educational movement in Germany, which in its efforts to educate the minds of the masses is second to only one great country in the world—the United States. And in this intense earnestness and enthusiasm about education is the secret of world-power—not in guns, in blustering kings and presidents or in jingo ministers playing at marauding and murder and calling them "empire."

The nation that has the greatest number of inquisitive and expanding brains, of skillful and energetic hands, that is the nation which in this era of the world's history will wield the mightiest world-influence and will be the greatest world-power, whether in peace or in war.

General Miles, ranking general of the United States army, asked for service in China. Following its usual course in dealing with the veteran general the administration refused to grant his request. The treatment of Miles by the McKinley administration has been little less than shameful. Since Miles' name was mentioned as a possible presidential candidate, and voted upon in the Democratic national convention of 1896, he has been slighted and humiliated on every possible occasion. A dispatch of August 6th says the allies lost twelve hundred of their sixteen thousand men at Peking on the 5th, last Sunday.

If nearly one-twelfth of the relieving forces were killed or placed on the wounded list when less than nine miles from the starting point, how many will be left by the time they march the eighty miles to Peking? It does not require a prophet to inform us that the allied army will never get there.

And probably three-fourths of the twelve hundred lost at Peking were only wounded. The remaining comrades must care for and protect them. No small burden of itself.

HARRY MILLER IN CHINA.

Could Not Reach His Post at Chung Kiang—On His Way to Shanghai.

Harry B. Miller, consul to Chung Kiang, China, has not arrived at his post, Mrs. Miller now at Tientsin, received a letter from her husband a few days ago. He stated in the letter that Nagasaki was crowded with fugitives and families of foreigners and tourists leaving the flower kingdom as rapidly as possible and gathering at Nagasaki.

Consul Miller wrote that he was then on his way to Shanghai, where he would receive instructions as to his future course of action until the present trouble ended. In the letter the writer did not enter into details of the situation as he found it, merely generalizing and saying that the refugees told horrible stories of Chinese cruelty. Mr. Miller's daughter, Laura, accompanying him, is with the families of some American officers.

POOR HARVEST GENERAL.

Benton County Grain Runs From 5 to 10 Bushels Per Acre.

MONROE, Or., Aug. 6.—Most discouraging reports of grain yield continue to come from every direction. On the farm of James Herron a piece of summer-fallow with a crop of fall wheat promised a heavy yield. Any one with knowledge of such matters would have guessed the crop to run at least 30 bushels per acre. The straw was very heavy and the heads large, the stand being thick, yet when threshed the result was a good average of 13 bushels per acre. On the other hand, the poor-looking crops make as many sacks to the acre as do the fine-appearing fields. The grain production is all the way from 5 to 10 bushels per acre, the latter figure being the highest heard of in this section of the country for wheat.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 6.—Reports from the San Gabriel forest reserve state that the great fires which have been raging there for the past two weeks are now under control. A vast amount of valuable timber has been destroyed.

A QUER CASE.—E. A. Salem Statesman: S. W. McDowell, who died in this city on Saturday last, was a well-known character in Oregon for many years. He will be remembered as the Doctor McDowell who made himself notorious as a self-named candidate for various offices, and then instituted of contests to establish his title thereto. One of the last and most notable of these was in 1888, when he printed tickets for himself as Presidential Elector and forwarded returns and documents to Washington claiming to be the only legally chosen Presidential elector. When C. W. Fulton carried the vote of Oregon back to the Electoral College, in February, 1889, he was confronted with the doctor's claims, and there was considerable trouble in getting rid of them. In 1891 the doctor was committed to the asylum from Portland. He had lived in Salem several years.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE.

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury in the Simmons-Buchanan Shooting.

WALLA WALLA, August 6.—The coroner's jury selected to hold an inquest over the remains of Will D. Buchanan, who was shot Friday night by James Simmons, at the home of the latter, after hearing the evidence of the officers and neighbors, as well as Mrs. Simmons, who was in the bedroom with Buchanan when the latter was shot, returned a verdict that it was a case of justifiable homicide.

Saturday afternoon word was received that Simmons was at Wallula after shooting Buchanan he had boarded a train and gone to that place between two cars. It is expected he will return to the city, and no attempt will be made to prosecute him. Mr. and Mrs. Simmons have been married about ten years, and have four children. Mrs. Simmons testified that they never had any domestic trouble, and that he had always provided liberally for his family.

HUMBERT'S ASSASSIN.
