JUSTICE, RATHER THAN COWARDICE.

Oregonian: "The American people never have greatly admired a white-feather party. They who, on this Philippine question, attempt to mask cowardice under the name of patriotism, may find themselves mistaken; and they certainly will, unless the spirit of the country has greatly changed since 1864, when a political party came before the country with a 'surrender' platform, in a crisis of war."

No intelligent person doubts that the Oregonian editor knowingly and premeditatedly utters a falsehood when he charges Bryan and his supporters with "cowardice" in dealing with the Philippine question. Let us call attention to some indisputable facts: The Filipinos had driven the Spaniards to refuge in Manila, and when Dewey destroyed the Spanish fleet before that city and obtained the surrender of the forts thereabout Spanish control and power in the islands came to an end.

The title gained by Dewey in the possession of Manila, and the cession of the islands by Spain for a monetary consideration, practically constitute the only equitable claims we have to possession. Examine the Filipino title:

Possession of the land of their birth, gained by a successful appeal to arms. Read the immortal Declaration of Independence, then ask your conscience if we should hold those alien patriots—alien both as to strains of blood, and country—as subjects and vassals?

We have faith that the conscience of the people of this great republic will not allow them to commit this great wrong—this breach of faith with former allies.

NEW YORK JOURNAL TEST VOTE.

According to the test vote taken by the New York Journal recently, William J Bryan will sweep Greater New York in November by at least 89,036 plurality.

Out of the total vote taken, 4,385, only 82 who had no vote in 1896 will vote for McKinley this year, whereas 295 indicate their intention, on signed blanks, to vote for William Jennings Bryan.

Two thousand, five hundred and fifty-six votes were recorded for Bryan, 1802 for McKinley, and 18 scattering. At this ratio, if the total vote in Greater New York this year is as large as in 1896, when it reached 519,296, the proportion of the two candidates in November should be:

For Bryan304,616
For McKinley..... 214,680

The Journal's advance poll of the mayorality contest two years ago proved a wonderfully accurate test of the real vote. It was a forecast of the fairness and completeness of which were proven fully by the official returns. This straw vote was taken with the same degree of conscientiousness, and the figures may be accepted as prophetic of the actual returns in November next.

ANTI-IMPERIALISTS CONVENE.

Chairman Boutwell and Bourke Cochran Are for Bryan.

The Anti-Imperialist National Convention met in Indianapolis yesterday. The speeches of Edwin B Smith, the temporary chairman, and George S Boutwell, the permanent president, brought forth much enthusiasm. The public meeting in the evening was much better attended, and the reading of Bourke Cochran's letter was the signal for tremendous applause. But the greatest demonstration of the session came this evening when George Boutwell, ex-governor of Massachusetts, and secretary of the treasury in the cabinet under President Grant, concluded his address as chairman with the declaration that he had turned his back on the republican party and would support Bryan for President. The delegates arose in their seats and tendered the ex-governor an ovation that lasted several minutes.

R M Walker, Formerly of Eugene, Ordered to the Orient.

Revello M Walker, in the Eugene postoffice as clerk during the administration of Mrs M L Washburne, arrived in the city this afternoon for a few hours visit.

Hospital Steward Revello M Walker, U S A, is under telegraphic orders, from the surgeon general, U S army, to report to the commanding general of the U S forces in China for duty. He left Cuba about 15 months ago, spending a few days in Eugene in June (a year ago) while on sick leave after return from the Islands. Since that time he has been stationed at Fort Wright, Spokane, Wash, in charge of the new garrison hospital. Has instructed a large number of newly enlisted hospital attendants and nurses at that garrison for foreign service. The home battalion, now on duty at Fort Wright, leaves for foreign service about October 1st, relieving a battalion of the same regiment now in the Philippine Islands.

Mr Walker expects to sail from San Francisco with a battalion of the 8th Infantry, now enroute from Fort Luelin, Minnesota, to that place. He will leave on tonight's overland train for the Bay City.

BYBEE MINES SOLD.—Grants Pass Courier: "F H Osgood has purchased the mining property of Wm Bybee, the well known miner and stockman of Southern Oregon, the reported purchase price being \$60,000. The sale embraces a number of mines, among them the Josephine mine on Rogue river, the Canyon creek placer and a number of quartz properties." Mr Osgood is the gentleman who recently purchased the Chauncey Dale mine in the Blue River district.

TIMBER MEN.—Henry Swart and George A Metehson, of Marinette, Wisconsin, arrived here last night, and this morning left for Lowell in a private conveyance to consult with cruisers at work on the Military road lands. These gentlemen represent millions, and we trust they will buy some of our valuable timber land.

SAWMILLS IN LANE.

Building New Ones—Buying Others—Contracts for Millions of Railroad Ties.

The scramble for Oregon timber and the activity in the lumber business is illustrated by operations in the hills west of Monroe. From there to Lake Creek vast bodies of timber have recently been located by Eastern men. The amount so taken is not known, but it reaches into thousands of acres.

J W Walters, who has long been operating a saw mill, ten miles west of Monroe, has purchased a big mill at Elmira, and has contracted with parties to cut for him three million feet of logs in the Lake Creek mountains. These logs are to be floated down to Elmira during the rise in the mountain streams. The undertaking is one of vast proportions; Elmira is in Lane county. The output of the newly purchased mill is to be ties for the Southern Pacific railroad. Mr Walters' contract is a sub-contract from the Booth-Kelly company at Grant's Pass, which is said to have a contract with the railroad for the delivery of nine million ties. The ties are for use on the Southern Pacific system in various parts of the Union.

Another feature of the operations in the vicinity is the construction, six or eight miles southwest of Monroe, of another large mill, now in progress. The mill is to be of 20,000 or 30,000 capacity daily. The entire output for the present is to be ties, also for the Southern Pacific. These ties, like those to be furnished by Walters, are supplied on a sub-contract with the Booth-Kelly company. The promoters of the new mill are Portland parties.
